

From the President

Our congregation and our community mourn the loss of Rabbi Amiel Wohl, Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Israel of New Rochelle. Rabbi Wohl served in steadfast commitment to the Reform Jewish community his whole life. Growing up a son of a Rabbi, he was an active leader in the youth movement. He served congregations in Texas and California before coming to New Rochelle in 1974 to become our Senior Rabbi.


I came to know Rabbi Wohl during his years as Rabbi Emeritus. He was formally retired after over 25 years on our pulpit. Even having retired he continued his tireless commitment to the community. Knowing Rabbi Wohl's steadfast faith in God and by extension, in humanity created in God's image, I believe he felt that every human interaction was a holy one and should be treated as

Board ofTrustees Minutes

Highlights of the Board of Trustees Meeting from Wednesday, January 16, 2019:

Rabbi Weiner called for a moment of silence to honor the memory of Rabbi Wohl. Rabbi Weiner spoke about Rabbi Wohl's dual role in Judaism: honoring the past and finding new ways to build and grow the reform movement. Rabbi Weiner said the best homage we can give to Rabbi Wohl is to say, "This is what I learned from Rabbi Wohl."

Rabbi Weiner spoke about his experience at the URJ convention in Chicago in December which united rabbis engaged in social justice work. Rabbi Weiner reflected on the success of

Mitzvah Day and all of the work the social action committee does at Temple Israel.

As the Director of Congregational Learning, Rabbi Nichols updated the BOT on the re-structuring of committees which will now be formed based on age groups/grades they serve: early childhood, elementary, teen, and college. Rabbi Nichols also reported on the success of Chavaya's Tzedakah fair and the RAC trip to Washington DC.

Adam Egelberg presented a comprehensive financial report that highlighted the growth in membership as well as the decline in pledges. Executive Director Anita Aronoff will continue to reach out to families who have yet to make pledges.

Anita Aronoff announced that Temple Israel will be participating in the 2019 URJ Congregational Assessment and Benchmarking Project. This includes a congregational survey, a financial operating benchmark that will compare our data to synagogues of other sizes, and a Board of Trustees self-assessment. An assigned

mentor will present analytics to the BOT in April.

President Liz Weingast thanked BOT members who attended the January 5th retreat with guest speaker Dan Libenson and the Brotherhood breakfast the following day. She thanked Todd Brecher for his organization of the events and to Syd and Ruth Lapidus for sponsoring the event.

David Itzkowitz updated the BOT on suggested enhancements to the safety and security of Temple Israel. Rich Alter and David Itzkowitz will attend to the details of the proposal and prepare a proposal for the next BOT meeting.

David Itzkowitz proposed that the BOT hire a qualified firm to perform a complete analysis of all base building HVAC systems, perform an energy audit, and make recommendations for repair, replacements, and upgrades of equipment. Mindy Stark will work with David Itzkowitz to research NYSERDA grants to help us fund these necessary capital improvements. Todd Brecher, recently appointed to the North American Board of

the Union for Reform Judaism, reported on his experience attending the URJ Annual Meeting.

Deb Blatt, on behalf of the Social Action Committee, reported on the Solidarity Fair that will occur here at Temple Israel on Sunday, February 3rd at 9:30 am including 15 organizations from the community that promote social action and social justice. This has been organized generously and enthusiastically by Howard Horowitz and Yonat Assayag.

Warren Agatston spoke about the efforts being made to collect oral histories from Temple Israel members. The hope is to get approximately 100 interviews from congregants within the year and to have the interviews archived and accessible from within and outside of the building.

Contributions are needed for the gala silent auction. Thanks to Ilissa Warhit and Greta Berenbaum for their continued commitment to this vital, fun, and highly successful tradition.

Rabbi's <u>No</u>te

As I write to you, I am screeching up the East Coast aboard an Amtrak train with my two colleagues and 12 tenth grade students as we return from Washington, DC, and the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism. This is an annual rite of passage for our Confirmation classes, going back many years. In fact, generations of Temple Israel students (and our clergy) have made this journey. We make this trip each year, not just for the fun and the bonding, which are outstanding, but also for the important things that occur there: deep learning about our values and beliefs, soul searching and learning how to voice our values to those who have the power to turn them into tangible benefits for our nation and the world. In my years of doing this trip, stretching back 28 years now, I have been a part of these seminars during both Democratic and Republican presidencies, Democratic and Republican houses of Congress and liberal and conservative Supreme Courts. Ultimately, that back and forth is an inherently good thing for our country. That vacillation between the hands that control the levers of power generally lead to a government that falls somewhere in the middle, representing an electorate that in past generations was likewise, generally, somewhere in the middle.

So, each year, we head down to DC, aiming to replicate the amazing experiences of years past, as well as knowing that we are headed into an environment of healthy give and take, exchanges of ideas and, often a frustrating, but importantly slow pace of change. This year, however, there was a different air in

Washington when we arrived. The government is, as of my writing, in the midst of the longest shut-down in its history. I've been on these weekends at the RAC under shut-down conditions before. But, again, this year was something different. Added to the mix was 5 inches of snow. DC barely tolerates an inch of snow under fully staffed conditions. These 5 inches, combined with the shutdown gave DC an aura of a wasteland. Nothing happening. Nowhere to go. Nothing to do.

DC was frozen, both literally and figuratively. Paralyzed, better portrays it. Worse, still, is the sense from all around us that there is complete resignation that, perhaps, this is the best we can expect

memorial, are emblazoned into the rock: "Out of the mountain of despair, a stone of hope!" I couldn't help but think of the sense of despair King and millions of black Americans felt then, in 1963. At the same time, that speech, on that day, in that place, was an important turning point in the fight for civil rights. In just the next two years, momentous legislation guaranteeing both civil and voting rights for all of our citizens would change our country forever.

Standing there, reminded me that in our current state of Washington despair, we too needed a stone of hope. This weekend, mine came in the form of our handful of days with our teens. Their earnest concern for our world



nowadays: dysfunction, despair, loathing. It was with that dispiriting sense all around us, that we arrived at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. While we go every year with our teens, the USHMM took on a rare role this year – a place of refuge, as it was one of the few places open in the entire city. The exhibits, moving and challenging in their own ways to all of us, only heightened the sense of despair outside.

Then, we made the short journey over to the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial. Standing there, King's words, from his famous "I have a dream" speech, the overarching theme of his and our country was evident throughout our intense learning. This contradicts the usual "kids today" zeitgeist that they are apathetic and ill-informed. In fact, they are acutely aware that they are living in times that are not normal, imperfect and ready for *tikkun* – repair. They engaged in our tradition and sources, debated ways we can change and live our values and prepared to advocate for the world they want to live in, not the one we are giving them. Then came Monday. Plans were shifting all around us as the snow and shut-down made all of our scheduled visits on Capitol Hill tenuous, at best. Not to be deterred, we stood for over an hour in

frigid conditions to get into the Supreme Court to watch oral arguments. Once inside, each of us had a little faith in our government and our American values restored. Before us, we saw the one fully functioning branch of our government, engaged in reasoned debate, questioning petitioners in a time-tested dance of resolving our national issues. In a year that has included much acrimony over the Court, it was a relief to see adults behaving adult-like in our government. I was glad that the students were there to see it. We all kind of needed it.

At that same moment, just feet away, the House and Senate were at a stand-still and a few blocks further down Pennsylvania Avenue, the President of the United States was essentially locked in the White House. On we marched, into the offices of our elected officials. Our teens, eloquently, powerfully told their story. They didn't ask, didn't beg or plead with our congressional leadership to do the right things in the year ahead – our teens were the adults in the room. They stood tall, used their learning, their wisdom and their voices. They articulated the future they expected to see and how they expected these leaders, our leaders, to make it happen. They were as clear and rational and as principled as those justices we had witnessed just an hour earlier. They weren't nervous, they weren't flustered and they certainly weren't intimidated. They spoke truth to power. These 15 and 16 year olds were the grown-ups in the room. Just one week before MLK Day, they were a stone of hope in a capital city of despair.

We stepped out of the office buildings of the US Congress into a day, and a future, that was suddenly bright and full of promise. Snow was melting. Hopefully, another kind of thaw was just beginning.

The fellowship is a year-long program that brings together synagogue educators from various denominations. Over the course of the year I will participate in workshops, and a mentoring process that will assist in the development of a new Israel curriculum for our program. The fellowship also affords me the opportunity to spend eight days in Israel this month. This is not my first trip as I have traveled a number of times between my

Bat Mitzvah and Graduate School, and also spent a year living in Jerusalem. I am looking forward to visiting familiar places and eating my favorite foods.

But the piece that I am most looking forward to is being able to study the land through looking at the complexities which exist as well as the people, democracy, and religious life. I cannot deny that I inherently love Israel; this love has been engrained in me since I was a child. The Hebrew word Qushiyot, meaning difficult questions, is at the core of this program and why I feel so fortunate to be part of the cohort. Teaching a love for Israel is part of our educational philosophy in Chavaya; teaching the love alongside the complexities is often challenging for educators. Past *Qushiyot* participants have reported that they left Israel after the eight day workshop with fresh eyes and

perspectives, ready to bring their new knowledge to their communities. I look forward to being able to do the same for Temple Israel.

Before a person departs for Israel it is customary to send them off by saying, *Nesiyah Tovah*!, may you have a good trip! I wish for a good trip, indeed, and look forward to seeing you when I return.
