Board of Trustees Minutes

Rabbi Nichols shared a word of Torah. In preparation for Passover, Rabbi Nichols suggested the Board of Trustees (BOT) regard themselves as if they themselves had come from Egypt, being grateful for freedom and making the holiday personally relevant.

Rabbi Nichols shared readings including one from *Integrity First for America*. Rabbi Nichols heard the lawyers from this organization, who are currently representing plaintiffs suing white supremacists in Charlottesville, VA, speak at a recent conference in Cincinnati. Rabbi Nichols also spoke on the rise in anti-semitism and the

appearance of swastikas locally in New Rochelle. New Rochelle Rabbis convened with the acting school superintendent, Magda Parvey to address this. There will be another meeting in April to encourage more education in the schools.

Rabbi Nichols provided the educational report outlining how Kehillah and Chavaya students are preparing for and learning about Passover. She reported that the *Mishaloach Manot* fundraiser was the most successful ever. Thank you to all who participated.

Adam Egelberg presented the financials. Chavaya has found new and creative sources of revenue and increased teen recruitment and participation. Camp Pinebrook ran a very successful Presidents' Day week-long camp.

Executive Director Anita Aronoff presented the Membership Report, which the BOT voted unanimously to accept. Anita continues outreach to families who have yet to make pledge commitments.

The BOT voted unanimously to increase the security fund from \$150 to \$200.


The BOT voted unanimously to increase tuition 3% for Kehillah and Chavaya.

Camp Director, Jesse Gallop updated the BOT on Camp Pinebrook enrollment and outreach efforts. Jesse reiterated the need for volunteer families to house our two Israeli counselors. Teenagers are being sought for counselor positions.

Gala Committee Chair, Berdie Stein, reported that with still a month to go, the Gala attendance list is already at 100 guests. Ilissa Warhit is running the silent auction this year and continues to seek items to include such as a vacation home/getaway, jewelry, golf or theater tickets, music concerts. The Oral History Project is actively training over 50 volunteers who are interviewing Temple Israel members. Stories are being shared within the community. Most recently, some of our long-time congregants met with 1st and 2nd graders to share stories.

Brotherhood's Purim Carnival was a huge success. Thank you to Dave Karlin for his generosity in time and effort.

Rabbi's Note

Dear chevrei (friends),

Having just returned with our congregational group from Poland and Hungary, I'd like to share a few thoughts on the experience. Before we left, people were asking me and the members of our group, "Are you excited for the trip?" I am not sure that excited really was the right word. None of us was truly eager to walk in the footsteps of the horrific events of the Holocaust. We felt compelled, a responsibility to go there. On the other hand, from the time that we first thought of this trip, it was meant to be far more than just a Holocaust trip - to make it that would have been a disservice to the 2,000 year history of Jewish life that preceded the Holocaust.

With that in mind, I think that the trip was a resounding success. We learned about

and visited the places which made Jewish life so robust for centuries. We sat in synagogues and walked streets that once teemed with profound rabbis and sages as well as everyday Jews for centuries. We tried to imagine their lives and communities. For so long, they were vibrant and strong. And then, destruction.

Those days when we explored the Holocaust sites and tread that ground, it was honestly challenging, but no less worthwhile. Even someone such as me, who is well versed in the Holocaust - as a rabbi and one who has studied this history thoroughly - even I needed to see it all with my own eyes to grasp the scope of what was destroyed.

And then, there were times for us to meet with and hear about, as well as participate in, Jewish life as it stands now in each of the three communities we visited: in Warsaw with a local rabbi and community member; in Krakow at the vibrant JCC; and in Budapest at the JCC which is the centerpoint of an urban Jewish community much like many you'd find around the world.

At the seder, just a few days

ago, the hagadah quotes the Mishnah when it instructs us: "In every generation, one must see oneself as if s/he left Egypt." Each of us can try to imagine, based on books, movies, family stories and more what life was like in Europe and what it might be like today. That being said, there is no substitute for being there. Stories cry out from the soil, the buildings, the sidewalks in ways that are completely unlike any other.

The trip, as I said above, was not exciting, but it was moving, memorable, inexplicable, heart wrenching and, more than anything else, so necessary. Each of us, for different reasons, needed to be there and it was made more special by being there together. I hope you will think about doing the same one day.

Temple Israel Members Join NYRAC in Albany to Lobby Statehouse on Greenlight Initiative

RAC-NY is a new initiative of the Reform Action Center of the Reform Movement (RAC) to lobby for legislation in line with our values as Reform Jews. RAC-NY decided to prioritize this immigrant friendly issue after careful deliberation. This legislation would authorize the issuing of drivers' licenses, regardless of a person's immigration or document status. Representing Temple Israel's Social Action Committee were Todd Brecher and Howard Horowitz, who traveled to Albany with RAC-NY. Todd and Howard were joined by over 90 participants from over 30 Reform congregations around NY State.

The delegation met with Senator Shelly Mayer and Assemblywoman Amy Paulin, co-sponsors of the bill. Currently the many thousands of immigrants who live and work in NY are unable to obtain a driver's license. Given the need to drive to work, take their children to school, activities and doctor's appointments the result is that they drive without a license or insurance.

When deliberating which issue to pursue, RAC considers the religious and social values of the Reform Movement. In addition

to protecting the "stranger," the bill has significant public safety benefits for all. The bill would allow undocumented individuals to be properly licensed and insured road safety for all. This bill would also insure that police can properly handle the policing of these drivers as they do with all other NY drivers (the police chiefs of both Ossining and Port Chester have endorsed the bill). In addition, the bill is estimated to add upward of \$50,000,000 in annual revenue for New York State from the fees it would collect.



Temple Israel Members Join NYRAC in Albany to Lobby Statehouse on Greenlight Initiative

In the meetings, the delegation expressed strong support for the legislators. The delegation explained how support for the bill is a reflection of the core values of reform Judaism and that, we, too, were immigrants, refugees and undocumented leaving Egypt right down to coming to these shores. Shelly Meyers and Amy Paulin responded that RAC-NY coming forward, a non-immigrant group in support of this legislation, is crucial to its future. The legislators asked the delegation to find more non-immigrant groups to join in the coalition to move the bill out of committee and onto the floor for passage.

The Social Action Committee of TINR is excited to be a part of RAC-NY and of this social justice initiative. Keep looking for updates in Temple Topics, TINR's weekly e-blasts and on social media. We will keep the congregation informed of how we are all able get involved and raise our voices in support of our values.

From the Interfaith Council for New Americans Westchester (ICNAW)

Dear Fellow Congregants and Supporters,

In 1939 Senator Robert Wagner (D-NY) and Congresswoman Edith Rogers (R-Mass.) sponsored a bill that would have allowed 20,000 refugee children (14 and under) to immigrate to the U.S. from Europe (10,000 in 1939 and 10,000 in 1940). It was a reaction to Kristallnacht (Nov. 9-10, 1938) in Germany. It had wide support among religious groups and labor leaders. It was opposed by nationalist groups and it never came to vote as Senator Robert Rice Reynolds (D-NC) blocked it from coming to the Senate floor. Rice was a venomous anti-Semite and Anglophobe who because of his seniority wielded considerable power in the Senate.

History repeats, and the venom today has been directed at immigrants from the Middle East, Africa and Central America.



The Ghafoor Family

The Interfaith Council for New Americans Westchester (ICNAW) and its 150 volunteers, from six Westchester County congregations, continue to work towards a higher goal of attempting to save lives rather than destroy lives. We are very fortunate to be working with HIAS, NY and with their guidance have helped to resettle Fardin, his wife Mahnaz and their three children from Afghanistan, who are all doing very well in their home in White Plains.

We are on the HIAS list for a second family this year and we need, as before, to be prepared to take this family in and give them the same support, love and attention as we did (and continue to do) with Fardin's family. (-As of press time, we will welcome a new family on May 14th. More details to follow-) We are also expanding our outreach in 2019 to working with Catholic Charities and Hearts and Homes for Refugees to assist in refugee resettlement in Westchester County. Visit www.tinyurl. com/TheGhafoorFamily to see how the Ghafoor Family is acclimating.

Thus, we are again asking you to consider making a contribution to the ICNAW.

100% of all funds received go to our refugee/SIV families. We know you get requests for donations from many organizations, but the funds you donate to the ICNAW have an immediate positive impact in the form of rent, food, medical care and education. In addition to your humanitarian action there is also a positive economic benefit as family members quickly enter employment and begin to pay taxes on income, and pay into Medicare and Social Security. Long term the benefits are even greater as the funds contribute to the growth and well being of the country.

We cannot change the world, but we can change our small corner of it, and that is significant.

We are very fortunate to have such strong support from our respective congregations and we hope you will be able to contribute once again.




