

From the President

Fellow Congregants,

This past month has been difficult for the congregation, clergy, staff, and for me personally. It's been very painful to see the congregation torn asunder and to find myself at odds with our clergy. As such I was heartened when Rabbi Weiner shared with me an advance draft of the letter he shared with the congregation on October 30th.

In that letter Rabbi Weiner shared his decision to no longer seek a contract renewal. He then immediately shifted his focus to our community: how he could help us to heal and to move forward. The following day I had an opportunity to meet

with the clergy and our staff. In that meeting Rabbi Weiner was consistent in his message, assuring the staff that he wanted nothing more from his next eight months with us than to help all of them work together to find the best path forward for Temple Israel. Rabbi Nichols, Cantor Schloss, and the rest of our staff are equally resolute.

At the same time I've heard from so many of you. The outpouring of love and support for Temple Israel, combined with the offers of your time and resources, have renewed my faith in our community and my resolve to join with our clergy and staff in ensuring that our best days are ahead of us.

To be sure, there is a lot of work to be done. That work has already begun. I'm very pleased to announce that long time Temple Israel members Ilissa Warhit and Todd Brecher have agreed to chair our rabbinic search committee. Over the coming weeks and months Ilissa and

Todd will work to ensure our entire community plays a role in charting our path forward.

The first step of that path will be to decide whether Temple Israel transitions directly to a new Senior Rabbi, or chooses to move forward with an interim Rabbi. Interim Rabbis are senior Rabbis who have been trained to assist congregations like ours with difficult transitions as we look for a permanent Rabbi. This approach would afford our community time to come together and collectively decide what our clergy team should look like in the future. Of course, this would also mean more change over the coming two years. The Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) and our own clergy favor this approach.

An alternative approach would be to move directly to a search for a new Senior Rabbi. This approach would be a quicker path to installing a new senior rabbi and require less change over the coming years. However, the timing

means we'd have fewer candidates to choose from. Additionally, some Rabbis will not consider a position with a congregation replacing a long-term Rabbi absent the use of an interim Rabbi prior to the installation of a permanent Rabbi.

Please watch for communications from Ilissa and Todd as this process unfolds. We'll continue to share updates with you in Temple Topics, in postings at the Temple and in our weekly emails. Of course you may always contact our Executive Director, Anita Aronoff, our clergy team, or any of the Officers of the Board of Trustees if you have additional questions. Our contact information is included in the Temple Topics masthead. May the coming months be easier than the last for all of us.

Rabbi's Note

Dear *chevrei* (friends),

I write this article just as we are finishing the holiday of Sukkot, a holiday where we celebrated the beauty and bounty of the fall harvest. I also write this article in anticipation of November, a month in America where we celebrate Thanksgiving and focus on all that we have in our lives. This juxtaposition is a wonderful example of how our Jewish and American values overlap and weave together; both of our identities

urging us to appreciate the good in our lives and express gratitude.

This Sukkot, however, our beautiful Temple Israel sukkah reminded us of another lesson – the fragility of life. Our sukkah, the grandest sukkah I have ever seen, was knocked over by the winds. While this unfortunate event seems to fit the definition of a sukkah as a temporary shelter, it can also be read as a sobering reminder that not everyone in our community has shelters or food supplies that are stable, reliable or consistent.

TIFTY, our high school youth group, finished the holiday season by delivering the groceries collected during our annual High Holiday food drive. The employees at HOPE Community Services'

Food Pantry were amazed by our parade of cars filled with brown paper bags. We were so proud to represent this community as we saw that our donations overflowed the tables and benches in the pantry. Our excitement was tempered, though, by a reminder of the great need in our community – as we unloaded our cars, just next door to the food pantry, HOPE was in the middle of serving dinner to a dining hall full of people experiencing food insecurity. This was an important reminder that our donations will only fill the shelves of the food pantry for a short time.

On Yom Kippur, Rabbi Weiner challenged each of us to find a way to make a difference in our local community. I hope that our successful food

drive is just the beginning of our efforts. As well, I pray that the feelings of gratitude generated by holidays like Sukkot and Thanksgiving serve as catalysts for action; that gratitude leads to generosity.

Board of Trustees Minutes

Word of Torah was given by Rabbi Weiner regarding the symbolism of Sukkot, lulav and etrog in connection with the recent news impacting our congregation. Sukkot represents the fragility of life. There is fragility in our home and uncertainty. Let's not lose track of the goodness and people who make up this community and values that served us well for over 110 years. The clergy offered the blessings over the lulav and etrog.

Rabbi Weiner reported on the feedback on the high holidays and the extraordinary circumstances the clergy faced on the bimah this year. Excellent feedback from congregants and guests. Timing issues improved over last year's high holidays services. The Sukkot festival was an outstanding success. Kudos to Margie Ostrove and Rebecca Elkus-Ferst for their leadership. There were approximately 140 congregants in the sukkah on Erev Sukkot during T'filah. This festival is for the entire community. All ages are always welcome.

Rabbi Nichols reported that there was a high retention rate of returning 8th graders from last year's 7th grade class. Rabbi Nichols also informed the Board of Chavaya's new immunization policy. Due to the new law in New York State eliminating a religious exemption, measles outbreak in recent months, and to align with New Rochelle Schools, immunization records will now be required.

Jesse Gallop provided an update on Camp Pinebrook. Despite initial projections of a \$38,000 loss for Summer 2019, the camp earned a operating surplus of \$15,000. 95 students were enrolled this summer, more than doubling our numbers from last summer. A new pricing model will be implemented, with a separate charge for bussing. Jesse was recognized for his tremendous dedication.

Our Treasurer, Adam Egelberg, provided the financial report. The endowment stands at \$2 million, and is projected to be \$1.7 million following the June withdrawal required to cover our deficit pursuant to the Congregational approval received at the June Congregational Meeting. Adam offered kudos to Rebecca Elkus-Ferst for recruiting 20 new students to Chavaya.

Anita Aronoff, Executive Director, discussed pledge commitments. 73% of members have returned pledge commitments to Temple Israel, down from 81% in the prior year. The goal is to have 90-95% of members to return their pledge commitment in before year end.

Richard Alter offered praise and gratitude to the clergy for their dedication under extraordinary circumstances. He also offered his gratitude to all the High Holiday ushers led by Sally Meisner and Laurie Dubner, the volunteer security force led by Sharon Gorman and Mitchell Tarnopal and our amazing musicians - both volunteer and professional. Though not required by the By-laws ahead of time, in response to a Board member request, Richard Alter provided for a rotating schedule of Exective Committee members to stand in, should incapacity prevent him from performing the duties of President.

The Board accepted the resignation of Trustee Amy Bass. Pursuant to the bylaws, the vacancy may be filled by the Board based upon a recommendation from the Nominating Committee.

Rich Alter explained to the Board that a new vote on renewal of the clergy contracts would be required as our By-laws require the matter to be raised at one meeting and voted on at a subsequent meeting. This was not done. As such the matter was being raised at this meeting for vote at a subsequent meeting. Rich further explained that clergy had been informed and that the vote would not take place until after the Board had had an opportunity to hear from the Congregation at the upcoming Congregational Meeting. Discussions took place regarding the agenda for the October 23 informational congregation meeting.

The Board passed the following motion which had been raised at our previous meeting: Be it hereby resolved that the Executive Committee, for this current fiscal year, in consultation with the clergy and David Itzkowitz may for the current fiscal year enter into a lease(s) with a lessee(s) for use of Temple space. Notice of the intention to enter into any lease will be transmitted to the entire Board at least 1 week prior to signing

The Board discussed new business including a committee to explore an after-school program.






