From the President

Dear fellow congregants,

Reports of anti-Semitic vandalism or attacks reach us daily. Here in Westchester we've seen incidents in our cemeteries, memorials, our youth sports and even in our schools. Temple Israel will continue to address this rising tide through education, advocacy, and practical measures on our campus. It's the practical measures I'd like to speak to you about. Increasing security demands have been a reality of Temple life for the last decade. We've been forced to make painful trade-offs, sacrificing mission dollars and to some extent, culture, for safety. Ten years ago you could have easily walked into any one of our building's entrances and strolled our halls or sat peacefully in our sanctuary. Our mantra of "audacious hospitality" kept our building open and freely accessible to anyone seeking its comfort, without question.

Today a visitor to our campus will have their arrival, and all subsequent movements, captured and recorded by combinations of our 16 closed circuit cameras. They may well cross paths with the New Rochelle police conducting one of their many daily drive-throughs. That same visitor will find only the main entrance available, though locked, with a security guard on the opposite side. Once inside our guest will interact with clergy and staff who have been trained in our emergency procedures. Left unseen will be the additional security precautions we have taken in reaction to the realities of our environment.

That same guest will be unaware we have staff on premises nearly 24-hours a day.

A few weeks ago we had a nighttime trespasser on our property. No damage was done, but I was comforted by the prompt response of our staff and local authorities. Although past 11 pm, the individual was spotted by staff and captured on multiple cameras. Our Executive Director, Anita Aronoff, was immediately apprised as were the New Rochelle police. By first thing in the morning Anita had already spoken with me, a detective from the New Rochelle police department and the Westchester County police. In response to the incident New Rochelle police increased their drive-bys, and at the recommendation of the authorities, we will now keep many of our lights on 24-hours a day.

Although this increased vigilance is not without cost, we can afford no other approach. You play a part as well. Please be patient when entering the Temple. The locked door and visual security check are for all our safety. As clichéd as it sounds, if you see something, say something. Our staff and clergy are always available to hear your concerns. Notice an occupied vehicle sitting in the parking lot? No, you're not being paranoid mentioning it. Something just seems "off" about something. Our staff will treat any of your concerns with confidentiality. Together we can help to keep each other safe while working to keep our building, and community, as warm and welcoming as possible.

Board of Trustees Minutes

In lieu of a word of Torah, Rabbi Weiner offered a prayer for our country given the news of the vote on the President's impeachment.

Rabbi Weiner provided a report on recent events at Temple Israel. Mitzvah Day was an amazing success, which exceeded our high expectations. Kudos to Amy Ecker, Mia Egelberg, Rebecca Elkus-Ferst and all the captains, the staff and volunteers who contributed to the success of the day. This is an amazing annual tradition, which involves Temple members of all ages.

Rabbi Weiner reported on the Union of Reform Judaism's ("URJ") Biennial held in Chicago, December 11-15. Temple Israel sent a delegation of eight including our three clergy members, Laurie Thomas, Director of Kehillah, Anita Aronoff, Executive Director, and lavleaders Todd Brecher, Bob Hirsch and Paul Warhit. Laurie Thomas spoke as a panelist about innovative ways to offer early childhood program. Congratulations to Laurie!

The biennial showcases the best of what it means to be a Reform Jew. Highlights included celebrating Shabbat with over 5,000 people, recognition of significant contributions of congregations and individual achievements. The URJ recognized Jodi Kantor, a New York Times Pulitzer Prize winner for her reporting on the #MeToo movement.

Four resolutions were passed during the URJ's plenary

session. They are resolutions on: 1) Anti-Semitism 2) The study and development of reparations for slavery and systemic racism in the U.S. 3) Private Prisons 4) Supporting those affected by the opiod crisis.

The president of the URJ, Rabbi Rick Jacobs spoke of the Reform Movement, the largest movement of Jews in the United States as not just a "big tent" but an ever-expanding tent. Reform Judaism has the opportunity to welcome and include more people into our community. The Reform Movement claims about 1.5 million Jews in the United States. Rabbi Jacobs believes this count is not accurate. He prefers to count the number of Jews by Israel's "right of return" standards, that is, having at least one Jewish grandparent. There is an opportunity for us to engage many unaffiliated Americans.

Adam Egelberg, Treasurer, provided his financial report. Recruitment for camp is off to a slow start.

Anita Aronoff provided an update on pledge commitments. We received 86 percent of pledge commitments, short of our 90 percent goal for December. With targeted communications, we received immediate responses from member families. If you have not already, please contact Anita to work out the details on your pledge commitment.

Rich Alter gave the President's report. He expressed gratitude to the Social Action Committee led by Mia Egelberg and Amy Ecker for Mitzvah Day and their incredible work with the "Giving Tree." Over 300 "wishes" were granted and over 250 volunteers participated in mitzvah day. Rich also expressed gratitude to the Brotherhood for their

annual tradition of cooking latkes for the Chanukah party. Finally, Rich thanked the layleaders who attended Biennial at their own expense.

Rich updated the Board on the past month's business. We entered into a year-long contract with the Junior League of Central Westchester to rent out a classroom for their program which supports a diaper bank. The program operates under a grant from the Department of Social Services to procure and redistribute diapers to families in need. The space will be used to store diapers and volunteers will be on site several times a month to repackage diapers for the clients they serve. We also continue to show our property through a commercial agent and have several leads.

Two committees' chairs were named: Jen Goldman will chair the HR committee and Sally Meisner will lead the Nominating Committee, succeeding Michelle Klein.

We have engaged with a consultant regarding a proposal to lease a small portion of our northern most part of our property for a cell tower. A committee was formed to examine the potential health consequences, which includes several physicians from the congregation. The annual rent would be approximately \$84,000/year for a five-year term. The Board raised questions on siting of the tower, moving to 5G service and insurance issues.

The Board voted in favor of designated income as parsonage for the clergy. This annual ministerial vote involves no cost to the Temple. A designated amount is excluded from the clergy's federal gross income in line with the Internal Revenue Code.

Committee Reports: The interim rabbi search committee is underway and the position has been posted. In the first quarter of the new year, the committee will hold parlor meetings with the congregation about the permanent rabbi search. Temple Topics will have a regular column devoted to our interim rabbi and permanent rabbi searches.

The Social Action Committee thanked the congregation, Board captains, Rebecca Elkus-Ferst and Sisterhood. The gifts for the Giving Tree went to children in the Bronx. Often times the gifts our congregation provides are the only gifts the kids receive for the holidays. The New **Rochelle Police Department** was also honored for joining us on Mitzvah Day. The Board thanked the Committee for reaching out to all different age groups and having opportunities that appealed to all.

The annual benefit for our music program will be held on Saturday, February 8, 2020 and the Temple Israel annual gala will be held on Saturday, May 16, 2020.

Cantor's Note

Greetings from the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) Biennial!

I am writing this article from my hotel room in Chicago. I'm here with our rabbis, executive director. Kehillah director and a handful of our dedicated congregants and lay leaders. And we join another 5000 fellow Reform Jews: clergy, educators, musicians, administrators and caring and active Jewish community members, to pray, learn, inspire and be inspired. We share a common attachment to Judaism and the Jewish people, but we are a diverse group in so many ways.

My week began with a meeting of the Executive Board of the American Conference of Cantors (ACC). Since we were already all in Chicago, we took the opportunity to conduct the business of the ACC in person rather than our monthly video conference. We discussed important issues for the cantorate: mentorship of new cantors, placement of cantors in synagogue pulpits, challenges impacting the cantorate of today and tomorrow, Transcontinental Music (the publishing wing of the ACC). But the meeting concluded with a chance to sit down with Rabbi Rick Jacobs, the President of the URJ. With Rabbi Jacobs, we were able to discuss our role as cantors in the broader tent of Reform Judaism, or really in all of Judaism.

One of the themes of Biennial this year is expanding the Jewish tent: welcoming those who in the past might not have found a place in Reform Judaism, nor in Judaism at large: Jews of color, interfaith families, Jews of fluid gender or sexuality within the broadest definition of the LGBTQ community. The new generation is the most diverse and complex in our human history. Rabbi Jacobs spoke of the need to embrace our diversity and ensure that we recognize the holiness and value of every person, no matter how different anyone might be from any other individual. This is especially true of people like me, who used to be the face of Judaism in America: a white, heteronormative, cis-gendered male from Ashkenazi roots. Judaism certainly includes people like me, but we are no longer, nor should we be, the only standard-bearers.

Reform Judaism is often thought of as the liberal branch of Judaism, separating us from Conservative or Orthodox Judaism. But unlike the various branches of Christianity-Catholics, Methodists, Baptists, etc.-Reform Judaism is not a denomination. It does not serve to separate us from other "denominations" of Jews. Rather, Reform is a movement. It is a practice, a community that serves to welcome and unite the Jewish people. To paraphrase Rabbi Jacobs, Reform Jews may not be welcomed and included in the narrowing Jewish definitions of certain Orthodox groups, but that does not mean that all Jews should not fall within our circle of concern. Reform Judaism, by its very definition, is able to adapt to meet the needs of a changing Jewish community. And as the largest stream of American Judaism, we can also stop thinking of ourselves as a particular sub-stream of Judaism. We are mainstream Judaism.

What's in a name? In 2003, The Union of American

Hebrew Congregations changed its name to The Union for Reform Judaism. In many ways, this name change made sense. We don't often refer to ourselves as Hebrews these days. We are Reform Jews-why not put it in the name? However, as our movement seeks to welcome all kinds of Jews and Jewish families, I believe the name is limiting. Both in the past and in our future, we are truly a union: diverse people and organizations coming together as one. But the old name also envisioned what is coming to fruition-we are more than Reform Jews; we are American Jews, welcoming all. In the face of growing anti-semitism and division, even amongst Jews, I am proud to represent our union; I am proud that Temple Israel participates in a true union of American Jewry.

The World Zionist Congress Elections are coming soon, and our congregation's votes are critical to maintaining a large Reform presence in the Congress! The election is our chance to have the Reform Movement's voice and priorities heard in Israel. It's a powerful way to combat the discrimination the Reform Movement faces from the Israeli government. The Government of Israel allocates nearly 4 billion NIS per year to Orthodox and Haredi institutions with only 10 million NIS to non-Orthodox institutions. The elections enable us to provide support for creating pluralistic and Reform programs with real financial impact.

The World Zionist Congress designates representatives and leadership of the Jewish Agency for Israel, The Jewish National Fund, and other

The Lived Reality in Israel and the Palestinian **Territory: Current Political** Developments and the **Prospects for a Peaceful** Settlement event was on Tuesday, November 26. The Israel Action Committee hosted Israeli and Palestinian civil society representatives who were in New York in November to bring their perspectives to the United Nations. Temple Israel was the delegation's only public engagement. They were brought to us courtesy of USA Friends of Mossawa ("equality") Center of Israel and the United Nations Committee for Palestinian Rights.

Our three panelists represented three of the major political, social and national constituencies the UN is concerned with—Israeli affiliates, which determine the allocation of hundreds of millions of dollars in funding. These organizations are the largest source of funding to the Reform Movement in Israel. With our success in the last election, we were able to secure 17.5 million NIS in funding for the Reform Movement.

Voting will take place from January 21 – March 11, 2020, and we will need to engage every single Reform Jew to vote for the Reform slate! Temple Israel volunteers will be manning tables at various temple events during this period to enable our members to vote in this critical election. Voting is online and takes only about 90 seconds. So look out for us and please vote!




