

From the **President**

The Rabbinic Search Committee

I would like to update you on our search for a new rabbi. I just participated in the most recent meeting of the search committee. As an ex-oficio member of the committee I've had the opportunity to participate in a few of the meetings and have spent hours with the group. That seems like a lot of time if you don't know that this group has participated in, and organized, dozens of meetings and spent hundreds of "man"-hours tirelessly working to find Temple Israel's next spiritual leader

The committee has 2 co-chairs and 9 members. The co-chairs are both Board members. Of the other 9 members, one is a current Board member, two are past Board members, and the other five are congregants, including one of our teens. While the chairs may have had some inkling of what lay ahead for them when they accepted their roles, none of the other committee members could have realized they were taking on a second part-time job when they agreed to serve.

My flippant comparison to a part-time job minimizes what they've undertaken. With a part-time job you do your time and walk away. This group is acutely aware of the long-term implications of their work. They've approached every aspect of their task with a sense of responsibility and fidelity to Temple Israel that's an enormous burden to them, and a blessing to the rest of us. I've been awed by the time and thought they have devoted towards assessing the strengths and weaknesses of the many candidates and how each candidate might be received by the many different cohorts in our congregation.

Many in this group were not previously acquainted with one another. Thrown together they've tackled difficult issues, navigated tough conversations, and are approaching the point where they can recommend a candidate to the Board. I've had the opportunity to meet with the remaining candidates. I'm heartened in the knowledge that any one of the remaining candidates will be a wonderful fit for Temple Israel.

At the same time, seeing such love and devotion to our community from such a wide assortment of our members, has renewed my optimism regarding Temple Israel's future. I have no doubt that some of the members of this group will be future leaders of our congregation. If I'm right, our next rabbi will have dedicated lay leadership partners to join with in ensuring Temple Israel remains a vibrant Jewish community for another generation.

Rabbi's Note

As We Enter 2021

It's hard to believe six months have passed since my arrival at Temple Israel

Indeed, many things have changed, and many things have remained the same. COVID-19 continues to impact our lives and redefine 'normal' in our daily routine and temple calendar. These past months have not unfolded as planned regarding face-to-face meetings (without masks) and coffees with congregants. Despite the obstacles imposed by COVID-19, I am grateful for the connections I've forged to date with staff, students, lay leadership, parents, worshippers, Torah and Responsa class participants. I have admiration and respect for the rabbinic search committee that, like the ancient Kohathites who carried the sacred ark on their shoulders, is dedicated to their mission of finding the next settled rabbi. I have come to appreciate the Temple Israel community—and the deep connections so many have to the congregation and one another. "Being social" has been difficult in a COVID-19 world, and yet, the Temple Israel Cares and Social Action committees have done amazing outreach. And when we meet virtually—the concern shown on those small square screens,

speaks volumes. Despite the fact that we seem to be living in a Groundhog Day scenario, I am excited to be working with a board committee on aligning the lay governance and day-to-day staff management of the congregation by delineating the various roles of key stakeholders. In addition, I look forward to guiding the nominating committee on creating an annual cycle for identifying and onboarding new temple leaders.

One year ago, I was planning a Village Temple teen Civil Rights trip to Alabama. Recently, I looked at my pictures and watched the video of the 87 year-old pastor, Calvin Woods, Sr, past president of the Birmingham Southern Christian Leadership Conference. Pastor Woods was the last person in Birmingham to see Dr. King alive, as he drove him to the airport to catch his flight to Memphis in April 1968. In looking at those pictures and watching the video of Pastor Woods singing "This Little Light of Mine," I was reminded of one of the aspects of Temple Israel that hasn't changed: it's commitment to the greater New Rochelle community and its involvement in the Interreligious Council of New Rochelle, of which Deborah Maher serves as vice president.

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Cantor's Note

The Power of Music

"Whenever the [evil] spirit of God came upon Saul, David would take the lyre and play it; Saul would find relief and feel better, and the evil spirit would leave him."

- 1 Samuel 16:23

Jewish music is as old as Judaism itself. In Torah we see (and hear) Moses, Miriam and all Israel sing a song of redemption upon being freed from Egypt. We sing some of those same words today in "Mi Chamocha." Three books later, at the end of Moses' grand speech to the Israelites when they are about to enter the Promised Land, Moses again turns to song. And the 150th and final Psalm instructs us most simply, "Praise God with harp, lyre, timbrel, drums, dance... and cymbals!" Above, we see another musical reference, that one of our greatest leaders, King David himself, was skilled in music. Notably, he uses music to provide emotional support and comfort to the afflicted King Saul.

These examples are not bound by a common function or meaning, but rather simply by music. Music accompanies our lives, both reflecting and affecting our emotions. We turn to music for praise, prayer, celebration, lament, and comfort. In our community, at this challenging time, we truly feel this full range of emotion. And yet, one of the cruelist ironies of the pandemic has been the prohibition of singing together. We cannot come together to sing in prayer on Shabbat. For those who love the theater or opera, stages are dark. As I write this, we are only a couple weeks away from our annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. commemoration Shabbat service which normally features the "Coalition Choir." Music is one of our most powerful of emotional tools, but like so much else right now, our participation is severely restricted.

But it is not completely forbidden. We may not be able to sing together as we would have in previous years, but we can still sing. And we can still hear music. I miss collaborating with professional musicians, with our volunteer choirs, with our children. But on a personal level, I find myself turning to music for inspiration and comfort perhaps more than in the past. Our MLK service (January 15th) will at least

January brings new resolutions, change, and an important holiday - Martin Luther King Jr. Day. We began our year meeting outdoors, taking advantage of our beautiful campus. By the end of October the seasons had changed and after feedback from our families and teaching staff, we made the necessary safety and health preparations to move indoors. One week before Thanksgiving we were forced to pivot again and move online due to a significant increase in cases.

Fast forward to the present, Chavaya resumed on January 4th and we have continued to meet online. The Chavaya educators, our clergy, *Manheegeem* (teen facilitators) and *Madreecheem* (teen assistants) who make this happen on a weekly basis are rock stars who have risen to the occasion,

explored and learned new technologies, and continued to engage and connect with our children and teens. I could not be more thrilled to work with this team! ZOOM also has presented me with the opportunity to be present within each group, and be able to be an active part of the learning taking place. In our Nitzaneem (3rd & 4th) and Ahleem (5th & 6th grade) we have modified our Hebrew program to include a 1:2 (one facilitator for every two children) structure to provide children with a more personalized experience. This change has been well received!

In our 7th-12th grade groups we have looked for ways to connect through learning and socialization. Our monthly Moving Traditions groups continue to meet and we've enjoyed competing in online Escape Rooms and other games. Our desire is to create experiences that bring our teens together because we know the upcoming months will continue to be difficult.

I hope that in my next Temple Topics article, I'll be able to share that we're meeting in-person.

Worship, Chavaya, and other committees at the Temple. She plans to have conversations about what changes we should make and what programs can we strengthen that are currently in existence. Rabbi Hirsch has learned a great deal about our congregation. In particular, she has learned that Temple Israel of New Rochelle is a social congregation! While COVID-19 has been an impediment for us to socialize and come together, we are congregating virtually. We are looking at additional opportunities this winter for adult education.

On behalf of Rabbi Hirsch, Dan Pomerantz, an officer of the Board, spoke about two matters.

- 1. A COVID-19 Temple Task Force was formed and committee members, who are all medical professionals, include Dan Pomerantz, Julie Rosenbluth, and Jeff Stier. The committee has been meeting with senior staff on what we can do and what we ought to do as a Temple. We are careful about our gatherings and we are looking to keep things meaningful when we do congregate. The Task Force will reconvene in the new year. Plans are made in short order because things are changing so rapidly.
- 2. Governance: A committee is reviewing roles of various leader stakeholders at Temple, including the president, the executive director, and the rabbi, as we move forward into 2021 and to prepare for our permanent rabbi. The committee is also clarifying Board responsibilities and will present updated job descriptions, in line with the Temple's bylaws.

Adam Egelberg provided the Treasurer's Report. The Temple is ahead of budgeted total membership contributions due to several large individual contributions from members. We should not be complacent, however, because we are well-behind collecting from members. We are grateful for all of our members' support.

With respect to Kehillah, we do not expect to come close to the \$370K operating surplus that was budgeted. The YTD operating surplus is \$60K. It is materially greater than month ago because of federal grants that Bright Horizons passed along to TINR. We continue to look for tenants to rent available spaces. Sixty-two campers enrolled for Summer 2021 to date. Jesse is going to contract for the extended two-week camp over the summer. We are ahead of previous years to date with our recruitment. We applied for the Paycheck Protection forgiveness and anticipate receiving the forgiveness.

Our treasurer, Adam Egelberg is available to our congregation if any member has questions about TINR's financial status.

Anita Aronoff, our Executive Director, reported that membership collections in December were down, at 86% of budget. We are making efforts to reach out to members who have not made commitments. We are also considering an appeal letter for the end of the year. Temple Israel is not alone in seeing a decline in membership collections.

Anita presented the membership report and reported that a number of families are relocating out of the area.

Marjorie Ostrove reported on Kehillah. With COVID-19 restrictions in place, we have 71.5 "FTE" participants, with a forecast of growing 2 to 3 per month. Kehillah recently held a virtual Chanukah celebration that was widely attended by

over 100 unique viewers on ZOOM. Marjorie thanked Rabbi Hirsch and Cantor Schloss for their efforts. Thanks to the Social Action Committee, Sisterhood, and the Early Childhood Committee for all of their support, donations and volunteer time. Several Sisterhood members read to the Kehillah children for Chanukah - an excellent opportunity for all to participate.

The Rabbinic Search Committee led by Carolyn Dudek and Ilissa Warhit provided an update. We are currently in the process of virtually meeting candidates. The Search Committee brought in two candidates in December.

The President, Rich Alter, gave a brief report. Brian Feinblum, who heads up the marketing committee, plans to talk to the Board in January.

Rebecca Elkus-Ferst provided the Educator's Report. Chavaya concludes its semester shortly. We are seeing solid attendance in the lower grades, but a decline for the high school since we went virtual. This is not a surprise. We are hosting different events including an "Escape Room" event for our teens. Rebecca plans to revamp programming in the high school, recognizing the need for more social connection, rather than emphasizing our curriculum. Changes are on the horizon also for 4-6th graders, to provide additional attention on Hebrew learning since we moved to a virtual model.

With respect to Old Business, a motion was made to recommend to the Congregation to amend By-Laws, Section 4.5, specifically the final sentence: "At least every other fiscal year the Treasurer shall arrange for an independent audit of the Temple's books and records." The intent was to find cost-savings. Rather than conduct an audit every year, the proposal was to pay for an independent audit every other year. The Board voted and opposed this measure.

With respect to new business, the Board reviewed the clergy's annual requests relating to parsonage. As the employer, we vote on designating a certain portion of their income as non-taxable as per IRS regulations. The vote passed during Executive Session.







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
