

Board of Trustees Meeting Minutes Wednesday, **November 17, 2021**

Rabbi Jay provided words of inspiration comparing the Chanukah story to the rededication of our own spiritual home. The rabbi shared the exciting past weeks, getting involved with Kehillah and Chavaya.

The rabbi also shared the pleasure of David Gill's presence from the German Consulate and the Brotherhood celebration: Bible & Bourbon.

Adam Egelberg, Temple Treasurer explained that maintenance expenses are a little ahead of budget. He also shared that the PPP loan was forgiven, increasing our revenue. Kehillah received an anonymous donation, which is also helping us to be ahead of budget.

Cantor Schloss shared a discussion about this week's Torah portion.

Community Shabbat was a great success—a perfect example of connecting God and people. The Veterans Day event with David Gill, successful sisterhood event, successful discussion with b'nei mitzvah families about gender identity and other challenging topics are all examples of Temple Israel's connection with God and people. Our greatest connection to God is person-to-person. The cantor expressed that he is looking forward to doing what we do and connecting community.

The Board voted to accept new members. The Social Action Committee and Temple Israel Cares reported that \$700 was collected in the *tzedakah* box. HOPE Community Services, Columbus School Food Drive (also with help from Brotherhood), and Community Service Associates (Mt. Vernon Foodbank) will be receiving assistance with these funds.

Committee Reports

Amy Ecker, from the Social Action Committee, reported that the Interfaith Council of Westchester is welcoming another immigrant family. They will be moving in on December 15th. If anyone wants to get involved more let Amy know at amybrose@gmail.com. They are still fundraising to assist the family. The Giving Tree is up (having since ended on Friday, December 10th).

Ilissa Warhit (co-chair) of The Advocacy Committee, works on social, economic, peace, food, climate change, race, and justice issues in our community. This committee is for people who want to be proactive beyond social action. The advocacy

Rabbi's Note

Freedom ring."



Dear Members of my Temple Israel Family:

On Friday evening, January 14th, Temple Israel of New Rochelle has once again been given the honor of hosting the annual Service of Celebration and Remembrance of the Life and Legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. This evening will feature faith communities coming

together to heal the spiritual pandemic of our day, erasing the hate – confronting hostility with love, and prejudice with understanding. On that evening, in the spirit of sisterhood and brotherhood we shall give voice to our prophet of hope, fifty-nine years after his iconic "I Have A Dream" address at the March on Washington.

In the words of Dr. King z'l, "...it would be fatal for our nation as a whole, and for us as individuals, to overlook the urgency of the moment. There will be neither rest nor tranquility in America..." until we obliterate systemic racism; and confront with unity of purpose the oldest hatreds that have emerged from the very beginnings of our human journey. To this day, both racism and anti-Semitism remain inexplicable and rampant. Let us remember that while prejudice against the Jews may be the oldest of all hatreds, sadly, it never actually ends with the Jews.

And just as we stood in step with Dr. King, in the struggle for civil rights for African-Americans, so too did Dr. King stand with us. This is what he said with regard to the oppression of the Jewish people by the Soviet Union: "While Jews in Russia may not be physically murdered as they were in Nazi Germany, they are facing every day a kind of spiritual and cultural genocide." He went on to say, "The denial of human rights anywhere is a threat to the affirmation of human rights everywhere."

In his support for Israel, Dr. King stated, "Peace for Israel means security, and we must stand with all our might to protect its right to exist, its territorial democracy. I see Israel as one of the great outposts of democracy in the world, and a marvelous example of what can be done, how desert land can be transformed into an oasis of brotherhood and democracy."

As Dr. King so poignantly demonstrated, through his words and deeds: we are all in this together, for what happens to one person of faith anywhere affects all people of faith everywhere. With hope in the future, as people of faith, of every nation and every background, we must come together to say "Never Again!" until there is love and opportunity and justice for all.

In the spirit of Dr. King and his prophetic vision and message –ever more relevant in this New Year – please join with us to raise your voice in the name of Dr. King's dream, and in his memory, ensure that "every valley shall be exalted, the rough

places will be made plain, and the glory of the Lord shall be revealed...from every mountainside, let Freedom ring."

I invite you to join with me, your Temple Israel family and members of our Interfaith community, to pray with and for one another at our MLK service, and together, daring to hope and through our good works, we shall overcome.

May God bless you and keep you.

Cantor's Note

"Where We Want To Be"



I love music!

That is more than just an obvious statement. It's actually the name of a beautiful song by the jazz pianist, Ahmad Jamal. And the song itself is not just a great song, but it exemplifies what is so wonderful, powerful and remarkable about music in general. The song's

main melody is quite simple, with an "A" section and a "B" section. Jamal plays these two parts over and over throughout the song. But what is so moving is how he plays the melody. Each repetition is different—a different feel, a different key, different harmony. The essence is the same, but with each repetition, Jamal interprets the melody uniquely, creating new meaning.

I was not fortunate enough to ever see Ahmad Jamal live. I only know this song from his equally great album, *The Awakening*. So i never really experienced this song I love completely—a recording is really just a historical example of what the music does so well.

Music must be created and recreated in real time. Bach, Mozart, Lewandoski, no matter how great the composer—their art doesn't really exist until people play it. The composers essentially write detailed instructions for creating the music. The art itself comes to life and then dies again with each performance. Imagine if Da Vinci had not painted the Mona Lisa, but had only given the instructions for how to paint it. And then after each artist created it, it would disappear, waiting to be painted again. That is the art of music. No one would ever know that the art had come to life unless they were there to witness it, to be present for the artistic creation.

Jewish prayer is not only often set to music, it also shares many qualities with music. Our siddur may be known as a prayer book, but it doesn't really contain blessings and prayers as we may believe. The siddur gives us the words, the instructions for prayer. The words do not become prayer until we say them, or better still, we sing them. And how wonderful that our tradition requires a minyan, a whole community, for many of these prayers to come to life. Each participant may play a different part, cantor and congregation, instrumentalist and singer, but together we create meaning, a real-time, living community experience.

In the next few months, we have several special musical, community opportunities. Our Temple Israel Sisterhood, Music Committee, and Brotherhood, had hoped to present Sam Sadigursky's *The Solomon Diaries*, a fresh and yet poignant approach to music inspired by the dramatic rise and fall of the Borscht Belt, the Jewish resort community of the Catskills that helped to shape 20th century American culture.


Accompanied by photographs by Marisa Scheinfeld, the music intimately fuses sounds of Jewish spiritual and Klezmer music along with classical influences, middle-eastern rhythms, jazz improvisation, and tinges of Americana. While the concert will now be rescheduled to a date later in the spring, this unique musical landscape, interpreted by these gifted musicians, gives us much to look forward to.

On January 14, we join with the Inter-Religious Coalition to celebrate the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. This special Shabbat service also coincides with Shabbat Shirah, the Shabbat of song. Together we will create a celebration and remembrance through music.

And on March 5th, we will present the Fifth Annual Music Benefit: "Where we want to be." We are asking you to make short videos, answering the question, "Where do you want to be this year?" You may interpret the question in any way. Perhaps it will lead you to a location, an adventure, a relationship, or simply a state of mind. Your short answers will help us create a musical evening reflecting the needs and desires of our community.

I look forward to being present with you for every musical moment in the months to come.

The Rabbi also mentioned the successful viewing of "Aulcie Perry" about an African American who led the Maccabi Tel Aviv soccer team towards winning its first European Championship. Rabbi Jay and Cantor Schloss are working together to create the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Commemoration / Shabbat Shirah Service with Victor Hall as the guest speaker. The event will take place on Friday, January 14th, at 6:30 pm. The event will be in-person and LiveStreamed. The Rabbi wished everyone a happy, healthy, and safe new year.

Cantor Schloss discussed the writings of Hillel, which advocated to not separate yourselves from the community. Cantor Schloss was very proud that the tone of the COVID conversation with the COVID taskforce kept two Jewish principles –a) not separating from the community and b) preserving health and safety. We have been able to hold two in-person Shabbat events and we are working with B'nei Mitzvah families to mark their entrance to join as adults in our community.

We have two wonderful musical events coming up: 1) Saturday, January 8th: In Concert - The Solomon Diaries at Temple Israel; 2) Saturday, March 5th, the 5th Annual Music Benefit "Where We Want to Be" - where the Community wants to be.

Everyone is encouraged to attend these events.

Anita Aronoff, Executive Director, presented the membership report. We are at 86% membership support. We will try to make 90% by December, and believe we will achieve 90% in January. Rosen Hall is in disrepair. Anita is working with the House & Grounds Committee getting bids to repair the floor and ceiling. Estimates will be brought to the board in January. More information to come.

Temple President Brian Heaps stated that Board members will be calling members soon to check on how they are doing. The Membership Committee met. The Committee needs more members to have broader representation. Non-board members are welcome.

Rabbi Jesse Gallop presented on Camp Pinebrook, and how

the original mission and camp has evolved since its inception. COVID created challenges, but in 2020 it was the only camp in Westchester that offered all 8 weeks-full day. Our goal for summer 2022 is to have 240 campers from ages 3-10. We are expanding our offerings to include: electives program for older campers, gymnastics, ceramics, more coaches and adult instructors, program directors supporting specialists and developing more overall camp activities.

CommitteeReports:

The Social Action Committee announced that The Giving Tree was a great success and thanked everyone for their participation.

Brotherhood and Sisterhood had a very successful Thanksgiving food drive at Columbus School, providing food for 300 families

Mara Roberge announced that we are forming a BBYO chapter. Eighteen teens showed up interested in joining and others, who were unable to attend, have expressed interest. There is interest and excitement around this new endeavor.

Childhood education. She has spent her first few weeks with us getting to know the children, staff, and families. We are very excited to have her as a part of the Kehillah community!







The Rabbi and the Reverend: Joachim Prinz, Martin Luther King Jr., and Their Fight against Silence, by Audrey Ades.




