As for other activities, we hope to soon bring back our community Shabbat celebrations with dining and are really looking forward to our first in-person Gala, in longer than we'd like.

In short, things are happening. I look forward to seeing everyone as we are able to again be together.

## **Board of Trustees Meeting Minutes Wednesday, January 19, 2022**

**Rabbi's Report:** Rabbi Jay began the meeting wishing us all a happy and healthy good new year. He pointed out that this is a time of turmoil due to what happened last Shabbat in Colleyville, TX. Yet, he also showed the contrast that in the very same weekend, Reverend Hall addressed Temple Israel as part of our Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. celebration. At that service we sang, "We Shall Overcome." We still have a lot to overcome.

In light of what happened in Texas, New Rochelle police were put on high alert. The rabbi and Anita Aronoff, Executive Director, have been working with the New Rochelle Police Department.

Rabbi Jay also announced that on Tuesday, April 5th, we will be the only synagogue to host a program from a museum

in Assisi, Italy, recognizing the work of righteous gentiles. Cardinal Dolan and Archbishop of Assisi will be in attendance. This will be an in-person and webinar program to be seen around the world.

Cantor's Report: Cantor Schloss expressed that he has appreciated his time at Temple Israel and being integral to this community; being with the community in difficult times and supporting the community. The cantor stated that he is not going

anywhere right now and has ample time to serve the community for several months, valuing and cherishing that time. It is his desire to fully serve this community as long as he is here.

The terrible events in Colleyville, COVID increasing and clergy change at Temple Israel have presented its challenges. Due to COVID, the Solomon Diaries and the Music Benefit were postponed, not canceled. Both are being held at a later date.

**Treasurer's Report:** We are tracking ahead of original budget due to Kehillah. Reasons that we are ahead is that we budgeted very conservatively, a generous one-off donation, and we received a grant from the government.

We will need to decide if surplus should go into land and capital or the endowment.

**Executive Director's Report:** Membership support is following the same trajectory as last year. YTD payments between temple and Kehillah are at the same level. We are confident we will make the budget as projected. Pledges are where we were prior year. Anita continues to reach out to members.

**Security concerns:** We participate with Community Security. They have a dedicated team for NYC and Westchester. They were here in December and did a comprehensive security report. Anita submitted a grant proposal for hate crime support. We are waiting to hear results of that submission.

There have been several online sessions with URJ, UJA, and Westchester Jewish Council.

Building and maintenance money is over-budget because of security. Security is a question on everyone's mind. We are addressing it and will continue to address it.

We will be applying in April for the Homeland Security grants, which are much larger.

**President's Report:** Both search committees are actively searching for an associate rabbi and cantor. We will be holding an in-person outdoor gala this spring! Anyone interested in helping with the gala please contact Margorie Ostrove.

Committee Reports: Social Action Committee co-chair, Amy Ecker, was very grateful to everyone in helping with The Giving Tree; Erika Tobia, Bronx Executive Superintendent, has 50 families affected by the recent Bronx fire. They need gift cards for food (GrubHub, Burger King, etc). You can drop off gift cards at the Temple office.

An immigrant family from Afghanistan will be moving to an apartment in February. Another family arriving will be reunited with other family members in Connecticut. Keep a look out for a special refugee shabbat!

**Temple Israel Cares** co-chair Toni Hoffman presented their new idea is to give flowers to ladies who are having milestone birthdays. They sent flowers to Adele Wasko for her 96th birthday. We are trying to commemorate good things.

**Kehillah:** Margorie Ostrove noted that end of the year goodie bags were given to Kehillah teachers in appreciation for all they do. Teachers were very appreciative!

**Advocacy Committee:** co-chair Ilissa Warhit announced that May 15th,will be the 2nd Solidarity Fair. We had 30 groups two years ago. Please think of any groups to invite linked to women's rights, gun control, LGBTQ rights, etc., and contact either Howard Horowitz or Ilissa Warhit.

**Rabbi:** Rabbi asked Minister Mark McLean to come to the pulpit at Temple Israel to talk about anti-Semitism and to submit a statement about anti-Semitism and what happened last weekend.

**New Business:** Rosen Hall is in need of serious repairs. Contractors have been contacted and we are discussing how to renovate to address various needs. The building and grounds committee is involved in this process.

## **Board of Trustees Meeting Minutes Wednesday, February 16, 2022**

Rabbi's Report: Rabbi Jay began the meeting with a blessing. He explained that it is the Month of Adar, a month filled with a sense of joy in the Talmud. It is this month we overcame the forces that sought to destroy us in Persia and the minions of wicked Haman. As we are filled with joy and of hope, let us overcome the issues and obstacles that we face, just as the Jews of Shushan did with joy and hope, vision, and going forward for a bright and glorious future.

**Treasurer's Report:** Adam Egelberg, treasurer, reported that although we are slightly behind in membership contributions, our funds from Kehillah are well ahead of projected.

Executive Director's Report: Anita Aronoff, Executive Director, reported the need for repair and maintenance on the elevator. The elevator was installed in the late 70s early 80s; New Rochelle inspected it, but the wiring needs to be fixed to bring it to code. We have received quotes from contractors and will be moving ahead with the most cost-effective contractor, contingent on board approval.

**Kehillah Report:** Jennifer Pennucci, the Director of Kehillah gave a report on where Kehillah is now and its future. Jennifer showed a beautiful slide show with children form Kehillah engaged in many different activities. Her presentation also included a short video with interviews with teachers.

Jennifer explained that the initial vision in 2012 was to have a comprehensive Jewish education experience for children ages 6 weeks to 6 years. The philosophy of Kehillah is to encourage creativity and development of young children and to engage children in age-appropriate activities. Kehillah uses thoughtful observations, providing challenges and opportunities for individual growth of each child. Kehillah School Educators meet monthly with Rebecca Elkus-Ferst, Director of Education: Youth and Families to formulate curriculum. Clergy also come and spend time with the children

Jennifer laid out a vision for Kehillah that will preserve the past ideals while elevating future programming integrated with our Jewish values, keeping children and families first and foremost.

The Board voted unanimously to release dollars from the Hirshenhorn Fund to provide grants to camp counselors and to cover the Chavaya trip to Atlanta.

# Rabbi's Note

# Passover...a holiday of symbols and freedom



Let us begin by showing appreciation for our beloved Temple Israel of New Rochelle, for Temple Israel is not simply a *Bet Tefilah* – House of Prayer, but also the *Bet Knesset*, the Spiritual center and the pulpit from which the needs, concerns and voices of people of good conscience and social justice are articulated and heard.

Temple Israel is not only a congregation that I am privileged to serve as its Rabbi, but also, along with you, it is now my spiritual home. Our Temple is the sacred space where you have celebrated the most important moments in your lives, across the full spectrum of the life cycle.

My years of service as a pulpit rabbi go back decades -- to a time that some have referred to as the glory days of congregational life. I realize now, taking on the challenges of a new pulpit during a worldwide pandemic, that glory is not measured in numbers, and with God's help, much glory still awaits us in the future, for we are a Temple family that prioritizes our congregants and stands on the front lines for Jewish survival in America, Israel and around the world.

My commitment to you goes beyond the professional and is at the very core of my being. I see it as a sacred commitment to be present and involved with you, the members of our Temple, in your times of need and joy, as pastor, confidant, friend, and extended family member. It is in this spirit of extended family that I share with you a few interpretations of the Passover symbols at the Seder table -- from my home to yours.

To begin, the Karpas, parsley, which is a symbol of spring, reminds us that just as seasons change for the better, so can life. We can all testify to the old saying, "March comes in like a lion and leaves like a lamb." Just as the storms of winter ultimately pass, so too, will the storms and hardships that came into our lives, and that we have continued to endure with COVID. With faith in God and ourselves, never losing hope and following the science, we too can weather the storms that came into everyone's life and emerge to a new day of renewed love, health, happiness and peace.

The Hillel sandwich, which is a combination of the sweet *Charoset* and bitter *Maror* reminds us that we have the strength to overcome the bitterness and difficult times in our lives and that we should enjoy the sweet moments in life while we have them.

The *Afikoman*, which is the broken half of the matzoh, reminds us of our need to work for Jewish unity; that we should not be a people broken, or divided against itself. – as Jews and as Americans. With the seemingly constant condemnation of the State of Israel, this lesson takes on greater meaning this year,

during a resurgence of anti-Semitism in the United States and across the globe since the end of the *Shoah*. It is as important today as ever to take the message of the *Afikoman* to heart, recognizing that we are one people of one faith, responsible one for the other. We must insist on Israel's right to self defense and speak up and speak out on behalf of the Jewish State to our elected officials in Washington. No other nation in modern history has sacrificed more and given up more of its territory in the pursuit of peace than the State of Israel.

The Egg is at the very heart of the Seder, for it represents our children. We are all familiar with the expression, "It's all about me." This approach to life is as unwholesome as it is un-Jewish. The Seder, however, is all about them, our children. It is their need to learn, to understand, to remember and to celebrate what we focus on at the Seder. From the days of Abraham, we were taught that unlike other peoples, we do not sacrifice our children, but rather sacrifice for our children. Our children and grandchildren are the future of the Jewish people, the future of the World, our immortality and sacred trust. We enrich their lives and help them on the way to secure a happy future when we show them, teach them about the glory, beauty, and joy one can find as a Jew who is involved with their people, Temple, and community.

And during these most challenging and trying years of the pandemic, in significant and profound ways, our families, including our precious Temple family, have provided us with a safe haven. Our relationships have strengthened and uplifted us as sources of hope, connecting us with one another and with the Eternal. And most assuredly, maintaining these connections, in spite of social distancing.

My family and I send you our most heartfelt wishes for a safe, healthy, joyous, and sweet Passover.

# Cantor's Note

# Jewish Holidays...Hopefully Starting to Share Connections!



In case you haven't studied your Jewish calendar lately, there are dozens of holidays scattered throughout the year, and many of them come up this Spring. Yes, some are more major than others. I hope to celebrate Purim with you all on March 18th (actually March 18th is Shushan Purim, the day after Purim when we will celebrate with the Temple Israel

community—but that's a whole other discussion). But I won't be terribly surprised by most, if not all, of us skipping the minor Fast of Esther (Ta'anit Ester) on March 16th, just two days earlier.

If I were to group the Jewish holidays in a very rough way, we'd have the Fall holidays and the Spring holidays. In between, in the Winter, we have Chanukah and Tu bish'vat. But honestly, they are both somewhat minor in the ranking of importance of our holidays. I've written in the past about the range of experience of our Fall holidays. I love how the majestic High Holidays, primarily observed in the synagogue, are followed immediately by Sukkot, celebrated outside in a ramshackle hut without a real roof! The Spring holidays at first seem similarly diverse. Purim features excessive drinking, wearing costumes, eating triangular cookies and putting on an irreverent piece of theater based on one of only two books in the bible that does not mention the Name of God. Passover, just a few weeks later, is probably the single most celebrated holiday in the Jewish Year. Even President Obama, not Jewish, hosted a Passover seder in the White House in each year of his presidency. Shortly after that we have the modern holidays of Israel's Memorial Day and Independence Day. And then after 49 days of counting the Omer (an ancient measurement of unthreshed stalks of grain) we finally arrive at Shavuot, commemorating the receiving of the gift of Torah at Mt. Sinai.

Despite this variety of theme, tradition and theology, these holidays share the single most important element of Judaism: community. As I mentioned, the Book of Esther, Purim's source text, doesn't even mention God. It is a celebration of the triumph and resilience of the Jewish people. Passover is a holiday mostly celebrated in the home. There is a prayerbook of sorts, the Haggadah, but largely it is a family meal with guests invited—a time for remembering our shared struggle as a people and our shared journey to freedom. Israel Memorial and Independence days honor those who gave their lives and celebrate the birth of the modern State of Israel: the first official homeland for the Jewish people in almost two thousand years. Finally, Shavuot doesn't really celebrate the Torah. Rather, it celebrates the gift of Torah. What's the difference? How much more value do we place on something cherished if we didn't purchase it, but it was lovingly given? And imagine that gift maintains its worth and usefulness for thousands of years. It is a gift that we value as a community and as a people.

This theme of community seems especially important given our past two years of pandemic. While we mourn those lost and pray for the healing of those who suffer illness, all of us have lost community. We have missed sharing meals, theater, concerts, lively classrooms, time spent with family and friends, and the fullest celebration of the Jewish Holidays. I fervently hope and pray that the recent lull in the COVID numbers extends itself through this Spring and we are able to share connections with one another as simple as a hug and as meaningful as the seder.

## **Temple Israel Does Good Work**

Temple Israel and the Social Action Committee continue to receive thank you notes from Giving Tree recipients. The most recent is below from one of our ICNAW (Interfaith Council for New Americans Westchester) families. We donated \$1,500 to the G. family to help feed that portion of their family remaining in Afghanistan. (See their thank you on the right!)

The actions our community takes make a difference. Whether it is participating in a project, donating financially, offering a compliment, or helping each other, the Temple Israel community positively impacts others and each other. These actions are a large part of what makes Temple Israel special. Thank you.

"Dear All,

I don't have the words to thank you enough and to thank the Temple Israel New Rochelle community.

The current situation in Afghanistan is catastrophic, and people are starving. I hear tragic stories from families and friends in Afghanistan. After the Taliban takeover, people lost their jobs, the small shops lost their day-to-day business, and these families who lived paycheck to paycheck are now in critical conditions. In such a difficult time, your money will provide food to families with small children and get peace of mind that they will not die from hunger. On behalf of all the families, who I will provide this assistance, I thank you and all the community members.

I hope that peace is established in all parts of the world and everyone has a normal everyday life.

Our Temple Israel community also stepped up to help families after the devastating Bronx fire on January 9, 2022. Temple member Erika Tobia, Executive Superintendent of the Bronx Department of Education, supports her students inside and outside the classroom, and this situation was no different. Erika and her team leapt into action to create care packages for 50 families with school-aged students. Temple Israel Social Action members donated through Amazon and donated gift cards for meals. Erika will advise the Social Action Committee of additional needs and opportunities to help when families are relocated. Thank you to all who have supported this effort.

#### HIAS & INTERFAITH COUNCIL OF NEW AMERICANS

It is expected that by March all Afghan refugees will be relocated from US army bases to cities throughout the United States. The next step is bringing over the thousands of refugees from lily pad locations overseas. The US uses lily pad locations to process evacuees prior to their arrival in the United States.

In the meantime, ICNAW's newest family finally moved into their new apartment in Greenburgh after two months of living with family in White Plains. Even though nine people shared a 2-bedroom apartment, there was never a complaint. The family is grateful to be in their new space with their five and one-year old sons. There is green space and a playground nearby. The family will now work with volunteers to learn their new neighborhood, manage marketing, new accounts, school and learning English for mom and the boys. It is a completely new experience for all. Dad (FG) is ready to interview as soon as the needed paperwork arrives. FG was one class short of finishing his MBA and is ready to be working. In Afghanistan FG managed supply logistics for the US, overseeing 20 employees and managing a multimillion-dollar budget.



Host Groups continue to look for housing in all areas of Westchester. If you know landlords, management companies, or developers that will work with co-signers with apartments in the \$2,000-\$2,300 range, please contact amybrose@gmail.com. Transportation, walkability, and a welcoming neighborhood are key factors.





first 15 young applicants, whose families are members, that join Camp Pinebrook's staff. This is a great opportunity for college and high school students.

This is Camp Pinebrook's 5th summer, and it's amazing to see returning staff. As we continue to grow, camp has developed positions for lead counselors and unit heads. Staff continues to come back summer after summer, and these young leaders gain skills and develop. The feedback has been that staff members love working at camp because of the sense of community, inspiring children, and having mentors.

Camp also hires traditional adults. If you know a nurse (RN) or First Responder (EMT) looking for a position, please contact me. Those who have backgrounds in activities such as martial arts, dance, science, and tumbling can lead activities. Adults who have educational and youth experience are invited to supervise multiple groups as unit heads. And we always hiring swim professionals.

Camp Pinebrook bases our program on values of community, respect, teamwork, compassion, and encouragement. It is our mission to be a home that exemplifies being mensches. Not only do we teach Jewish ethics and responsibility to our youth, we also know that we need it for the adults in our community as well. # **The Ghost of Railroads Past**

In 1912, the same year that saw the sinking of the Titanic, a railroad was born in Westchester County. The New York, Westchester and Boston - which was built with the intention to connect these three major regions of the Eastern Seaboard, was a crucial link, at its inception, between central and southern Westchester and the Bronx. To get to Midtown, passengers were required to change trains at East 180th Street and take the IRT – which later became the 6 train – to Manhattan.

The NYW&B, as it was known, ceased operations in late 1937 after only 25 years of service, but is very much alive to the members of the Facebook group that bears its name. Perhaps what is most important and relevant about the NYW&B is that it not only connected southern and northern New Rochelle, had stations and sidings that served North Avenue, Wykagyl Gardens, Ward Acres and Quaker Ridge, but also because its Right of Way (ROW) once ran through the property upon which Temple Israel was built.

On a recent impromptu hike of the Temple Israel site, two members of the NYW&B Facebook group found several fragments of the railroad within the boundaries of the Temple's property. As the railroad once ran through the Pinebrook neighborhood nearly at grade level, one can see some of what remains by following a fairly swampy, uneven track from the Ward Acres property (which features an obscure horse cemetery) to the Temple. This ROW offers glimpses of culverts still running over streams, the remains of stone bridges, the bases for catenary towers and every so often, a fencepost or mechanical remnant.

For those who may be interested, a seminar about the history of the NYW&B is being planned for May of 2022. Stay tuned for more information.
