Board of Trustees Meeting Minutes Wednesday, May 18, 2022

Rabbi Jay offered a prayer of thanksgiving and of inspiration. He offered warm thanks for his tenure at Temple Israel. He specifically wished Rabbi Gallop success and happiness. He reminded us that he would love to stay in touch and be available for anyone who would like to reach out.

The Treasurer reported that Temple Israel has a budget surplus and a portion of the surplus funds will be used to pay down the camp loan. The remainder of the surplus will be discussed at a future meeting. Anita Aronoff announced that the temple has received an anonymous donation of \$150,000, with \$100,000 dedicated to the Rosen Hall renovation. The Board voted unanimously to accept the generous donation. Temple Israel also received a small federal grant (\$7,200) to cover weather related damages to the temple. Anita also announced that membership support is at 97% of budgeted support, and we are in a similar position compared to last year. Also a search committee has been assembled and actively searching for a new camp director. Interviews will begin as early as next week.

Temple President, Brian Heaps expressed his gratitude to Todd Pekats and Mitchell Tarnopal for organizing a breakfast on July 10th to introduce the new clergy team to our congregation. Transition committees have been established for the new clergy.

Rebecca Elkus-Ferst presented a proposed K-12 Vision Plan for 2022-2023. The plan was developed in many meetings with the Chavaya co-chairs, Chavaya committee, and Chavaya parents. Highlights include: a desire to bring the whole Chavaya community to be present in the temple at the same time on Tuesday afternoons from 4-6. The proposal also includes bringing 3-6th graders to Temple İsrael on Thursday afternoons. Families have the option of 30 minutes of oneon-one on-line Hebrew tutoring or a two-hour at-temple experience including Hebrew tutoring, homework help, and an elective. The proposal also includes an optional family track for families of children in kindergarten through second grade, which would involve three sessions per month. This option would be in lieu of the weekday sessions. Seventh graders will have their b'nei mitzvah prep during their Tuesday afternoon session. These seventh graders would volunteer with younger students in place of the traditional mitzvah project. The teen program (8th-12th grade) will continue in the traditional Tuesday evening fashion. Teens will also have the option to choose among a menu of teen engagement opportunities. Either of these options would keep the teens involved and allow them full participation in events like Confirmation and Graduation.

The Advocacy Committee held a solidarity fair and the event included many strong and vital local institutions. Local news (Channel 2) and local politicians came to the event. Thank you to Ilissa Warhit and Howard Horowitz for organizing this amazing event.

In other good news, work on Rosen Hall has begun and mazel tov to Rabbi Gallop on the completion of his MBA.

Special Congregational Meeting Minutes Wednesday, May 23, 2022

At the Special Congregational meeting Rabbi Jay gave a blessing of hope and love to achieve good things to the best of our intellect. He extended his wishes that this be a time of new beginnings, and that this new beginning brings what we hope for. "May the new year be filled with the joy of being Jewish. May this be a year of peace and love, a year together. Erase the hate wherever it manifests and fill it with love."

Cantor Schloss: followed with three prayers relevant to this moment:1) a shehechianu to mark the leaving of a cantor and rabbi and welcoming of a new cantor and rabbi, 2) the prayer recited after reading the Torah, which is, "Be strong, be strong, let us strengthen each other." 3) the prayer when returning the torah or approach the new year—"Cause us to return to you Adonai our G-d, make our days, renew our days like before."

Lloyd Robinson, chair of the search committee read a statement from Rabbi Jesse who was unable to attend the meeting. Rabbi Jesse is stuck in Atlanta with some of our TINR teens that were there on a social action trip and had their flight cancelled due to inclement weather.

Dear Members of Temple Israel of New Rochelle,

I wish that I was able to be with you this evening. It was my plan to be at the congregational meeting, but yesterday's storm cancelled our flight back from the Teen Social Justice trip learning about the Civil Right movement. Spending five days with Temple Israel teens across Alabama and Georgia has been holy and an awe-inspiring experience. But as my grandma used to say "Humans make plans and God laughs." So, please accept my apologies for not being able to answer questions and present myself in person.

It is a deep honor and privilege to be presented to be your next rabbi (if accepted). I believe strongly that our community needs a rabbi that can be a spiritual leader who nurtures our community with hope and healing. Over the last 5 years, I have been blessed with the opportunity to work with many children and families at Temple Israel in Camp Pinebrook, Kehillah, and Chavaya. As Rabbi Jesse, I have brought my love of Judaism and learning into our programs. For me, being Jewish is about how we live our lives and treat one another. As Rabbi Hillel taught, "If I am for myself, who will be for me? If I am only for others, what am I? And if not now, when?" Our world can often seem broken and too often in pain, so it is up to us to be God's partner. Together, we will pick up pieces of broken shards and bring healing to the world, making room for the Eternal in our midst. It is my hope that our community can build a home for all who want to enter, that is inclusive, generous of spirit, and kind.

Through the rabbinical search process, I have begun building deeper relationships with many adult members. It has also been an honor to lead the congregation in worship, sharing the intimacy of prayer. It is my hope and desire to inspire us to work together in a way that brings the divine spirit into our community. And if you do not know me well, please let's make time to sit and chat. By building relationships and trust, we can do amazing things. I want to be YOUR rabbi. I look forward to, and hope to have the opportunity to work with Cantor Glassman, our temple staff, and each of you, in strengthening our synagogue. Hand in hand, in true partnership, we can continue the legacy of Temple Israel of New Rochelle, where we are strong for many generations to come.

Lloyd thanked the Rabbi Search Committee for their diligent and tireless efforts. Committee members included: Jason Morris, Dianne Heaps, Art Ostrove, Cantor Reps, Greta Berenbaum, Gary Morse, Julia Ecker and Val Etra.

Lloyd explained the careful and thorough efforts of the committee and the search process. He then explained why the committee, unanimously and enthusiastically recommended Rabbi Jesse to the board to be our Rabbi. Rabbi Jesse graduated from the University of Denver in 2001. He went to HUC and graduated in 2007 and was ordained as a Rabbi in 2008. From 2005-2008 he was the student Rabbi at Beth Chaverim in Richmond Virginia and the from 2008-2001 he was the Rabbi there. From 2010-2016 Rabbi Jesse was the Assistant Rabbi, then the Associate Rabbi at Congregation Beth Ahabah also in Richmond Virginia. From 2016-2017 Rabbi Jesse was the Rabbi at Beth El Temple in Monroe NY. Since 2017, Rabbi Jesse has been the camp director here at Camp Pinebrook. Rabbi Jesse lives in Larchmont NY with his two adorable twin boys, Holden and Parker.

Following those remarks, Lloyd formally recommended Rabbi Jesse Gallop to be the Rabbi at Temple Israel of New Rochelle.

Following the Rabbi recommendation, Sharon Gorman as chair of the Cantorial Search recommended Cantor Rita Glassman as our next Cantor. Sharon thanked everyone who participated in this search committee including: Marilyn Morris, Linda Capozzola, Judy Pinals, Warren Agatston, Liz Weingast, Dan Weiser, Brian Feinblum, Margie Mangot, Rachel Davis, Rachel Morse, Ryan Topol, Lauren Pekats

Sharon also thanked Brian Heaps, Jeff Stier, Lloyd Robinson and the members of the board of trustees for their assistance in this process. And a huge thanks to Anita Aronoff for her assistance with handling much of the logistics. Sharon then proceeded to explain the painstaking process of the committee.

The committee was pleased that they had two strong candidates to choose from and ultimately put forth the recommendation to hire Cantor Glassman. Cantor Glassman received her ordination and Master's degree from the HUC Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music – Jewish Institute of Religion. A life-long learner, she has completed coursework in Jewish spirituality, interfaith studies, and is a board-certified Chaplain focused on bereavement and hospice care. She also received an honorary doctorate from HUC.

New this year: In-Person Small Group Hebrew Tutoring, Electives & Homework Help for 3rd-6th Graders!

When we re-imagined learning for the 2020-2021 year, the one area I felt the most strongly about was individualized Hebrew lessons. We saw an increase in engagement and reading fluency when we shifted from classroom based learning to a 2:1 model. Students receive a 25-minute lesson each week with a dedicated teacher: no changing groups, or remembering what page they were on, or figuring out what to do when one member of the group is absent or late.

We are also excited to be offering elective classes for our 3rd-6th graders on Thursday afternoons. Children will be able to choose from different classes such as Cooking, Sports, and Art. Families will receive class information at the beginning of September.

Finally, we will be offering Homework Help for this age cohort on Thursdays. The Homework Help program will be staffed by Temple Israel teens who have demonstrated excellent skills in specific subject areas. If you are a parent of a teen and think this role might be of interest to your child, please have them connect with me.

Better Together is Back!

What is Better Together?

For the third year in a row, we are pleased to be able to bring the Better TogetherTM: An Intergenerational Program with our teen and adult population. The goal of the program is to sensitize students to the challenges of growing older and incorporate Jewish learning and values in their interactions with the older members of their community. The Better TogetherTM program, now an integral part of our 7th-12th grade curriculum, includes the opportunity to create meaningful relationships between our adult and teen community. Activities will include art projects, music, text study, and documenting our shared memories. At the end of the year, we look forward to a celebration of all that we have accomplished.

The program will take place at Temple Israel. If you are an older adult looking forward to sharing your experiences and wisdom with our younger teens while engaging in meaningful interactions and learning opportunities, then this program is for you!

If you are in 7th-12th grade and looking to build a relationship with older adults in our community, while having fun, then this is the program for you! Teens will also receive community service credit for their participation.

Our program is funded by the Legacy Heritage Foundation's Better Together program, and there is no cost to participate! Interested in hearing more? Reach out to Rebecca at relkusferst@tinr.org

We visited the Rosa Parks Museum, the Lynching Memorial, and the The Equal Justice Initiative's Legacy Museum. Each brought us so much historical knowledge and allowed our group to truly understand the terror, humiliation and lack of dignity that members of the Black community endured.


Our teens spent the day in Selma learning about the history of the Civil Rights Movement there with Mr. Terry Chesnut. Mr. Chesnut's father was Dr. J. L. Chesnut, Dr. King's lawyer. Mr. Chesnut told us that when he was six years old, he went to the jail in Selma with his father to free Dr. King. We also spent time in front of the Browns Chapel church, the launching point of all three attempted marches from Selma to Montgomery.

Mr. Chesnut led us on the very same path that the marchers took across the Edmund Pettus Bridge to get to Montgomery.

Today we attended the Ebenezer Baptist Church, where Dr. King preached. It was an incredible service and we were lucky to be in the presence of their Senior Pastor, Raphael Wornack, the first black Senator in Atlanta. Our group also toured the Aurburn Street neighborhood, where Dr. King was born.

We are headed back to New York with our hearts and minds full of humility and appreciation for those who risked so much to make our world a better place.

Hanger Steak on the Grill (see recipe below ... Bon Appétit!)

HANGER STEAK ON THE GRILL

INGREDIENTS

- 6 scallions, thinly sliced (white and pale-green parts only)
- 1 garlic clove, chopped
- 1/3 cup soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 tablespoon (packed) light brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
- 1 teaspoon toasted sesame oil
- 1 2-pound hanger steak
- Kosher salt

PREPARATION

- Combine scallions and next 7 ingredients in a large re-sealable plastic bag and mix well.
- Add steak; seal bag, pressing out excess air. Turn steak to coat. Refrigerate overnight, turning bag occasionally.
- Build a medium-hot fire in a charcoal grill, or heat a gas grill to high. Remove steak from bag; wipe off excess marinade.
- Season both sides lightly with salt. Grill steak until well browned, about 6 minutes per side for medium-rare.
- Transfer to a cutting board and let rest for 10 minutes. Slice thinly against the grain.
