

Having gratitude is one of the core *middot* (values) in Judaism. We recently finished the holidays of Sukkot and Simchat Torah where we give thanks to God for the bounty of the fall harvest and then rejoice in the opportunity to finish the Torah, and then to begin again. Even in our daily prayers, the *Hoda'ah* is one of the benedictions within the Amidah: where we acknowledge our awareness for the gifts that grace our lives.

Being thankful shapes my rabbinate in many ways. I have been deeply touched by the connection and care that has been shared during the High Holy Days season. I am honored to be your rabbi, not only for worship and holiday celebration, but to learn with you, share life, and support one another during happy and hard moments. # Cantor's Corner

"The Little Holiday
That Could."

"You are a fortress in my life and in Your honor these candles I light Always stay in this home, in this heart I promise to remember and do my part Until the time that all humankind Learns to live with love and with peace in mind I will sing and bless this night Thanking You on Chanukah for this miracle of light"

In the second century before the Common Era, the Persian King Antiochus IV ruled over the Holy Land. While King Antiochus #s 1, 2 and 3 seemed just fine with the religious practices of the Jews living in Judea and Jerusalem, Antiochus #4 did not much care for the fact that the Jewish citizens of his kingdom had different ideas about how to worship the Almighty. So, like King Pharoah in the Book of Exodus who "did not know Joseph," the "anti" King, as I like to call him, decreed that all Jews give up their religious faith and adopt the culture and customs of Greek society. Clearly, Antiochus #4 must have had no real relationships with the Jewish folk in the neighborhood. He most probably never experienced a Jewish Sabbath, a Passover Seder, or shared and listened to personal stories of individuals within the Jewish community, discovering common interests and points of human connection.

As, sadly, we see in Ukraine today, there is one authoritarian foreign ruler who believes he has the right to take over a people and their land without any regard for those peoples' well-being, autonomy and preferred way of life. There is no meeting of minds or hearts, only a thirst for power and control. The famous Bob Dylan song "Blowin' In the Wind" comes to mind. "When will they ever learn?" Indeed. War is never the answer for anything.

Idol worship was especially popular among the Greeks in those "not so good for the Jews old days," and there is that *midrash* about our ancestor Abraham, who smashed all the idols in his father Terach's idol shop to prove a point. Abraham was a believer in one God, and saw the oneness in everyone and everything. Idolatry was definitely not going to go over big with the Jews of the second century BCC. The Greco-Syrian army went on the attack, defaming and desecrating the holy Temple in Jerusalem, slaughtering thousands of Jews who would not give up their faith and adherence to Jewish law.

Soon, a powerful resistance arose among the Jews, which turned into a major revolt led by brave Judah Maccabee, his father Mattathias, and his four brothers from the town of *Modeen*. They took on the army of Antiochus against all



odds, determined to overcome the forces of hatred and intolerance, and preserve their identity as Jews.

After three years of guerilla warfare, the small but mighty Maccabees were victorious, and drove out Antiochus's men from their land. Immediately, the Maccabees reclaimed their beloved Temple, purifying and rededicating it to the service of God. One little flask of oil in the Temple's menorah, meant to only last one day, miraculously, burned for eight whole days and nights. Chanukah means "dedication." The rededication of the Jewish Temple occurred on the 25th day of the Hebrew month of *Kislev* according to the lunar calendar.

So we celebrate Chanukah for eight days and nights each year, lighting our menorahs every evening at sunset and retelling our story of triumph over those "who did not know us" and who tried, unsuccessfully, to snuff out our spirit and our light.

Truth be told, among all the Jewish holidays, Chanukah was considered, for many centuries, a **minor** festival. It is not mentioned at all in the Torah, and comes to us through the Book of Maccabees. Other than the instructions regarding the lighting of the menorah and the reciting of Hallel (the Hebrew Psalms), Chanukah was more or less a holiday for children through the ages-a time to gather with family, sing Chanukah songs and play *Dreidel*.

But, like the little engine we read about as kids that defied all expectations, Chanukah is truly "the little holiday that could." In the 19th and 20th centuries, it has taken on much more major significance. Perhaps it is because Chanukah is really a holiday of HOPE-a reminder that while there is darkness in the world, there is also light and goodness in it. We have the capacity as human beings to stand up in the face of tyranny, to focus our attention on and rededicate ourselves to bringing more light and goodness into our often troubled world, so that it might find a way to wholeness and peace.

This Chanukah, as we at Temple Israel of New Rochelle light our menorahs, may we create something beautiful, holy and healing out of all that light. Because when you really boil it down, like the little train engine that no one believed would make it all the way up the hill, the light of Chanukah can illuminate our human potential and the strength of the human spirit. It's all about the power of faith and hope, knowing and caring for one another, working together to make life better, not just for us in the Jewish world, but for all who dwell upon this earth. May it be so.

# From the President

# **Providing a Spiritual Home**



I failed. Yup! I made a commitment and didn't keep it. I could come up with a lot of legitimate excuses, but it doesn't change the fact that I did not adequately follow through. Let's be realistic; I'm not unique. Almost all of us, at one time or another, have made commitments we haven't kept. So, what am I talking about and what am I going to do about it? I'm glad you asked because it affects all of us

Last November, in Temple Topics I spoke of "The Nones." This refers to a growing group of people who indicate in surveys that they have no religion or do not affiliate with any particular religious group. The number of Americans who do not identify with any religion continues to grow at a rapid pace. The group who do not affiliate make up one-fifth of the U.S. public – and a third of adults under 30 –, the highest percentages ever as reported by the Pew Research Center. Many of the 46 million unaffiliated adults in the country are religious or spiritual in some way. Two-thirds of them say they believe in God (68%). More than a third classify themselves as "spiritual" (37%), and one in five (21%) say they pray every day. The majority think that religious institutions benefit society by strengthening community bonds and aiding the poor.

I said, "I intend to gather groups of congregants who are willing and able to ask tough questions, not just of ourselves, but of those who have chosen to be unaffiliated." It didn't happen. I failed.

Why is this important to me? Because I believe we have the

ability to provide a spiritual home for many that describe themselves as unaffiliated. Rabbi Jesse spoke of the impact of COVID-19 and the societal change to religion and institutions, during his sermon on Rosh Hashanah, that as human beings we are all trying to make sense of life. And only when we learn how to join one another, and form a community will we be able to find comfort and meaning.

With the renewed enthusiasm and warmth of our clergy, staff, and lay leadership, I feel a desire amongst us all to be here, at Temple Israel, participating and welcoming new faces and those who have taken a hiatus from our family. It is this spirit that I hope will attract more new faces, but not without efforts from us all. Mind you, it's not about raising numbers; that's the result of our creating a community that not just welcomes others, but one where others want to be a part.

Please reach out to me and give me your thoughts. Together, let's enhance our community. Let us offer a space, both spiritual and secular, a tent, that is open to the needs of our community, the affiliated and unaffiliated. Let us think of what we can do additionally and differently. Let us all go even more out of our way to be welcoming. If you see an unfamiliar face, introduce yourself.

Together, as a community, we can increase our likelihood of success and strengthen our bonds with each other. The future of Temple Israel truly is bright, but it is up to each and every one of us to help us shine the brightest.



### **Sufganiyot Recipe**

In honor of the "Festival of Lights," TIC brings you a scrumptious sufganiyot (Israeli donut) recipe.

While there may not be a scriptural basis for eating sufganiyot on Hanukkah, pretty much all scholars can agree that fried donuts are amazing and a perfect fit for a holiday focused on commemorating one night of oil lasting for eight.

Donuts are a favorite seasonal snack, eaten mostly in winter at Chanukah. These doughnuts, cooked in oil, commemorate the oil that burned in the ruined Temple in Jerusalem for 8 days, although the supply appeared to be enough only for a single day.

The secret of a really delicious donut is the freshness, so, fry these just before serving. The dough can be made well ahead of time and refrigerated until ready to use.

### **Ingredients:**

2½ cups all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 2 eggs 1½ cups (12 ounces) sour cream 2 tablespoons sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 11/4 cups vegetable oil (for frying) 1 cup powdered sugar (for coating donuts)

### How to:

- 1. In a mixing bowl, combine all ingredients except oil and powdered sugar. The batter will be very soft.
- 2. In a deep skillet, heat oil until hot enough to fry a 1-inch cube of bread in 1 minute. Carefully place dough, a tablespoon at a time, into oil. Fry donuts, a few at a time, 3 to 5 minutes or until golden brown on all sides. Remove from oil with slotted spoon and drain on paper towels.
- 3. When all donuts are fried, pour powdered sugar into a plastic or brown paper bag. Add a few donuts at a time. close bag, and shake gently until well coated. Repeat until all donuts are coated with sugar. Serve warm.

Makes about 25 donuts.
