Board of Trustees Meeting Minutes Wednesday, November 16, 2022

Rabbi Jesse opened our meeting with a blessing to inspire us all to support each other and build community. He further thanked the congregation for the clergy installation service and helped us look forward to the year to come. Mitchell Tarnopol sent an email thanking Anita Aronoff for her adaptability in coordinating a funeral for a non-member who needed a venue for a warm and welcoming service.

Temple treasurer Lloyd Robinson reported that YTD finances are better than projected. Details are available in the board packet. Investment balances remain strong.

Executive Director Anita Aronoff reported on outreach to congregants and suggested that we should move forward to ensure that our "membership report" accurately reflects our engaged membership. The board continued the discussion about how to engage congregants, including the possibility of creating a strategic engagement committee.

Temple President Brian Heaps referred members to his notes in the board packet. In addition, he encouraged board members to contribute to the <code>tzedakah</code> box. The board discussed the challenges of cash contributions and noted that we should promote the use of Zelle. Brian reported that there is an ongoing taskforce to discuss the most appropriate role of honorary trustees during board meetings. The taskforce has suggested prioritizing input from active trustees above the input of honorary trustees.

The board discussed the recommendations of the investment committee and unanimously accepted the committee's recommendation that the bulk of the temple's endowment remain in a relatively low-risk investment portfolio while we are addressing much-needed, substantial capital improvements to our building.

Anita and a taskforce have continued to converse with several vendors to update our HVAC system. Bid requests were sent to three different firms, including our current provider, Johnson Control. Bid results came in with the best pricing from Johnson Control. Johnson Control has provided excellent service in recent years. The question of redundancies was discussed. The taskforce recommends that we move away from our current redundant (two chiller) system in favor of a less expensive, one-chiller system. Of note, the proposed upgrade does not completely upgrade our system, but addresses only a portion of our physical plant.

The board voted unanimously in favor of a motion to approve up to \$300,000 from Land Building and Capital to fund the installation of a single 40-ton chiller, understanding that \$50,000 of the \$300,000 is being provided by the Anfang Foundation.

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Rabbi's **Note**

"Let us make Temple Israel a home..."



All four of my great grandparents came to the United States of America, around the turn of the 20th century, as poor Eastern European immigrants. They came from Poland, Russia, and Lithuania. The family narrative is that all of their families' port of entry was in Galveston, Texas and they migrated north to Minnesota. However, I know that immigration laws and enforcement were more relaxed in those times. So, I am not truly confident that my entire

ancestry came to this country through legal routes, because they could have easily come via Canada, and illegally crossed the border.

America became a vital haven of safety and protection for Jews and other religious minorities. Even the founding by Puritan Christians was because of their mistreatment back in Europe. Our nation has prided itself on welcoming diverse populations of the world, and how the diversity of their ancestry has made American the tapestry of cultures while uniting around our universal values of freedom. This is one thing that I love about our country, that we are welcoming; and that immigrants are what have made us a great and mighty nation.

Judaism also protects and recognizes the needs of immigrants. The Jewish Bible teaches, in 37 places, the commandment to the love the stranger. While the Torah only commands once to "love our neighbor as yourself" (Lev. 19:18). However, to love someone who is different, a foreigner, can be harder and therefore the act is to love God and all God's children. That individual is not like us, dresses differently, speaks a foreign language, and has his/her/their own customs and communal practices. And yet even when we are uncomfortable, or dislike the difference, we are still to love the person.

World War II reshaped Jewish America. After the war, the Jewish people became united in face of the atrocities of the Holocaust and slaughtering of 6 million of our people. And together, American Jews helped to solve the refugee problem. This can be seen in our nations' immigration quotas, which were very limiting leading up to and during the Second World War, compared to after 1948 when the US congress enacted its first refugee legislation, providing immigration to 650,000 displaced Europeans. And this time Jewish refugees, both those from Eastern Europe, and now including Jews of the Middle East and North Africa, were able to migrate to North America or the newly formed state of Israel.

As our ancestors were "wandering Arameans," survivors of crusades, inquisitions, pogroms, ethnic cleansing, and other forms of persecution, we know what is means to seek safety just like today's refugees and asylum seekers. Friday, February 3rd, 2023, is Refugee Shabbat, when synagogues

across North America recognize, honor, and advocate for those seeking safety and a home in our country. We give voice to the struggles and terrors of the more than 84 million people who have been forcibly displaced, including the 26 million refugees (HIAS). And sadly the conflicts in our world hurt so many innocent people: mostly coming from Ukraine, Syria, Venezuela, Afghanistan, South Sudan, and Myanmar.

The U.S. government has resettled over 3 million refugees since the enactment of the Refugee Act of 1980. These individuals have come to our country and made us stronger, more inclusive, and a better nation. The federal government vets these individuals with complex security checks that are run by multiple departments and agencies. And these new Americans become hard working neighbors, where 82% participate in the labor force (HIAS). Sadly, during the COVID pandemic, America has severely reduced the numbers of individuals to enter our country. In both 2020 and 2021 the United States admitted under 12,000 individuals compared to the peak of over 122,000 in 1990 (Department of Homeland Security). Most refugees coming to America are from Congo, Syria, Afghanistan, Ukraine, and Burma. The state of New York resettles around 6% of refugees and 15-30% of asylum seekers (DHS).

As a congregation, and as individuals, we have the opportunity to support those who need help as they seek a new life in our community. Thank you to the Social Action Committee, and the important work that they are doing. Please join us on Friday, February 3rd for our community Shabbat, where we will join with other synagogues in acknowledging the important work that is still needed. And may we each take a more active role in helping support refuges and asylum seekers here in America. Let us make Temple Israel a home that welcomes the stranger, and may we strive to love them by knowing them, respecting them, and helping support them as they become part of American society.

Cantor's Corner

"Help us, restore us, renew us once more..."



Turning, turning, turning 'round To the One whose love has no bounds Help us, restore us, renew us once more As you've done many times before

Give us the strength to begin again And guide us in all that we do Help us keep faith when we lose our way 'Til we find our way back to You, back to You

Turning/Hashiveinu-Music and English Words by Cantor Rita Glassman (Hebrew from Lamentations 5:2) from the CD "Begin Again:Songs of Hope and Renewal"

On Friday night, November 4th, 2022, together with my Rabbinic partner, Rabbi Jesse Gallop, I was installed as Cantor of Temple Israel of New Rochelle. It was a glorious evening with a full sanctuary, so many members in attendance, my sweet daughter present for the lighting of Shabbat candles and Kiddush, my esteemed colleague Cantor Benjie Schiller from Temple Beth Am Shalom in White Plains officiating, and a scrumptious dinner afterwards in Forbes. Along with all of these blessings and causes for celebration, there was one more thing that happened that evening that filled my heart with joy and gratitude. Just minutes before leaving home for services, I learned that my original composition "Turning/Hashiveinu" which I sang on Kol Nidre back in October had been selected among hundreds of submissions for publication in a new High Holy Day Music Anthology to be distributed by the Union for Reform Judaism next summer.

As I write this article for the January/February issue of Temple Topics, I am reminded that I composed the song "Turning/ Hashiveinu" at this time of year in 2019, close to **Tu Bishvat**, the holiday we often refer to as Jewish Arbor Day. In the Talmudic Tractate - Mishnah Rosh Hashanah - and according to the Jewish Kabbalists, there are actually **four Jewish New Years** in our lunar calendar year, and Tu Bishvat is one of them. Another name for Tu Bishvat is **Rosh Hashanah La-I-lanot** - the "New Year of the Trees."

Indeed, Rosh Hashanah was many months away when I sat down at the piano to compose a song based on the words in the Book of Lamentations – "Hashiveinu Adonai Eylecha V'nashuva" - "Return us to You O God and we shall return." Somehow, I got to thinking that preparing for the Jewish New Year and making the changes we wish to make in order to lead better, more fulfilling lives and bring our best selves into this world, might need to start a bit earlier in the year than September. Spending time at the midyear mark reflecting on and reassessing how we are doing with all those resolutions we made six months earlier seemed like a good idea. In order to be ready for full-on Teshuvah (Return and Redemption) over

the High Holy Days, an early review of and recommitment to our self-improvement goals could be beneficial. And what better time to do this than when nature is beginning to renew itself, preparing for all that will grow and blossom in the spring?

Finding our way back to the Source of all life, and to our own essential nature surely takes ongoing mindfulness, attention, and commitment. While we may occasionally lose our way, if we stay on the path with trust and faith, ask/pray for guidance, eventually, just like the buds on the trees, an opening can appear, and we are once again shown the way forward. It was in the middle of all these reflections that I ended up writing *Turning/Hashiveinu*, closer to Tu Bishvat, the New Year of the Trees, rather than Rosh Hashanah - the time of shofar blasts, elaborate worship services, and honey cake.

As we celebrate the beauty and abundance of nature this Tu Bishvat (which falls on February 6th), eat various fruits that grow in the Holy Land, and recite the *Shehecheyanu* blessing, may we also find time to renew our commitment to the goals we set for ourselves half a year ago on Rosh Hashanah. May we come to know that it is never too early or too late to turn our hearts to the One "whose love for us has no bounds," renew our days, strengthen our faith, and "begin again" with hope, joyful anticipation, and much promise.

Hale and Hearty Soup

3 to 4 pounds lean short ribs, additional bones 1 can of tomatoes 4 carrots 4 stalks of celery, cubed 3 to 4 quarts of water Parsley, chopped fine 2 large potatoes, cubed 1 package of dried vegetable mix Salt, to taste

Put all ingredients into a pot and cook slowly on low heat until meat is tender (about 2-3 hours).

When cool, the unused portion can be put into the freezer. Meat may be used for boiled beef to be served with horseradish sauce.

This recipe is from the kitchen of Mrs. George J. Hirsch and was excerpted from Temple Israel of New Rochelle's "The Blessings of Food and Flowers"—a collection of "the most prized recipes of members of the Sisterhood" circa the 1950s-60s.
