### Rabbi's Note

### **Temple Israel - a Home for Everyone!**



A synagogue should feel like a second home to our entire community. It's a place to celebrate life's joys and support one another during times of hardship. Ideally, we make friends, observe holidays, learn about our heritage, repair the world together, and engage in living our values and ethics, which in turn, strengthens the congregation. At times I hear that temple is just "for our children," and yet, we know that Temple Israel brings meaning and purpose to our adult lives as well.

We have been blessed with a 116-year heritage of Jewish living, community involvement, and improving the world. It is so exciting to see Temple Israel revitalize itself again with its great diversity of activities, strong youth programming, and beautiful worship services. The question arises, what do we want to become, how do we grow and strengthen? For me, the answer is YOU! You make the difference. Your investment and participation makes our congregation special. That is why we will be exploring how to better engage all of our members. We have plenty going on already. Thank you to the Brotherhood and Sisterhood for their many years of wonderful programming and engagement. I also want to recognize the Social Action Committee and Temple Israel Cares, where we actively support members and the larger community in times of need, fulfilling our responsibility to improve the lives of others. Our education with Kehillah, Camp Pinebrook, and Chavaya actively engages our youngest members to love community and to love being Jewish. One of my favorite things to do is attending Torah Study on Saturday mornings, whose participants are smart, inquisitive, and actively wrestle with sacred texts. We also have active adult learning through our Israel Action Committee which brings speakers and offers classes. In many ways we are a strong shul.

And yet, as the world changes, our synagogue needs to keep evolving. We know that American demographical trends require that we reflect and ask, *"Who may not feel welcomed?"* or *"Who could be more engaged?"* For example, after many years, our teen youth group changed national affiliations. While we are a Reform synagogue, we recognize denominationalism is less important for younger Jews. For us, the most important thing is to actively engage our teenagers in a positive Jewish environment. Our local youth group joined BBYO.\* Regarding youth group events at the synagogue, there is very little difference, it is still a peer led program that is inclusive, Jewish focused, and supported by our staff. But when our teens go to conventions, there are now more offerings that meet their social needs. In 2024, our community started a new social group called "The Neighborhood" targeting those in their 30s and 40s. Studies have shown that younger professionals are less comfortable within the synagogue setting, and do not commonly choose to join a Temple as members. Temple Israel is not only a synagogue, but it is also a thriving Camp and Early Childhood Education Center. We are focusing on outreach to these parents and families, and actively engaging those who have remained on the periphery. By making friendships and creating community, our congregation is organically connecting with the next generation. "The Neighborhood" will be offering quarterly programs at local establishments, making it easy to build a strong relationship within our temple community.

We are also beginning to explore how to better engage senior members. For many years, these lifetime members actively came and led our synagogue. However, since 2020 and the outbreak of COVID-19, we all experienced a social deficit. We are exploring how to better engage and support these individuals, making sure that our seniors remain connected to Temple Israel.

These are just a few examples of our evolution. Together, the board, the temple staff, and the clergy will be exploring our vision for Temple Israel. It is my hope to be your spiritual leader, and that together we remain a strong and beautiful congregational community. There are so many things to celebrate. Thank you to each member who invests in our synagogue, and a huge thank you to our volunteers and leaders that give so much of their time and energy. Together we are serving God and community, making our temple a home of Jewish living.

This season brings us one of my favorite Jewish Holidays – Purim. I love this holiday because it's not just a celebration of our Jewish survival in the face of antisemitism, but it is another example of the heroism and strength of Jewish women. I am proud to be part of a religion that values women and acknowledges our contributions to our community. I'm proud to be following in the footsteps of many amazing women who have served as

Presidents of this great congregation. The story of Esther is a remarkable tale teaching us the importance and effect that just one person standing up to adversity can have on history. It feels very timely as we, as a Jewish community, and as Jewish individuals, are struggling with the rise in antisemitism in our current society. Just like Mordechai and Esther supported one another, so are TINR and the New Rochelle communities supporting one another. This was most recently evidenced by the outpouring of support we saw when two local Jewish-owned businesses were defaced with hate speech. The spontaneous demonstration of togetherness and strength, bolstered by the support of our local politicians and the Jewish and non-Jewish community, was uplifting. 
Sunday, April 7th Breakfast at 9:30 am 10:00 am - 12:00 pm

### "Board" Bulletin



### The TINR Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, January 24th for its regular monthly meeting. Highlights of the meeting included...

We started the meeting with an amazing cake baked by Rebecca Lippel, followed by a board member get-to-knoweach-other take on the game "two truths and a lie." The Rabbi offered an opening commentary reflecting on this week's torah portion. This portion teaches in part that the individual members of a community need to be involved and invested for the community to thrive. He also updated us about upcoming educational events related to the Israel-Hamas war. In our "Good and Welfare" portion, Anita Aronoff, Executive Director, called the board's attention to a lovely email received by TINR leadership describing the recent Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Shabbat as among the most moving and meaningful events in the writer's 30-year affiliation with TINR. Brian Heaps thanked the Rabbi for the Florida TINR Get-Together.

The board then moved to regular business. The minutes from the January 4th meeting were reviewed, amendments offered, and unanimously approved. Michael Goldberg reminded the board about several upcoming events, including an "Understanding Israel" series, and "Refugee Shabbat."

The board reviewed the Treasurer's Report and requested clarifications regarding our investment portfolio. The board reviewed the Executive Director's and President's Report as well. We reviewed details of Camp Pinebrook enrollment, as well as the camp's potential for growth. Our current camp capacity is 300 campers (certificate of capacity with the City of New Rochelle). Because of limits in pool capacity, we have a maximum capacity of 290 campers. We are awaiting a return on investment evaluation for building a third pool. Brian Heaps questioned what type of rental income is being generated by Handelman Hall. Anita will provide information at our next meeting. A motion was made and seconded to approve the new members and resignations. The motion passed unanimously.

Brian Feinblum introduced an idea for a program for an adopt-a-congregant endeavor. His proposal would ensure that each congregant has easy accessibility to a board member to ask questions or share concerns or recommendations. Additionally, the program could be used to strengthen connections within the community. Each board member would be asked to send an initial introductory email to the congregants in their group, followed by an invitation to a "Meet-Your-Board-Member" Zoom call. Participants in these Zoom calls will be offered a "discount code" for an upcoming Community Shabbat dinner. The board expressed consensus support for the program.

The board then discussed and approved proposals to approve funds for 1) the repair of our elevator, 2) for a professional

grant-writer to assist in applications for security grants, and 3) for the burial of sacred texts in Sharon Gardens. We last opened the burial site more than nine years ago. The event will be coordinated with our Mitzvah Day events. There will be a graveside service, as well as beautification of burial sites in the TINR section of Sharon Gardens. We strongly encourage all congregants to participate. The board next approved the nomination of Jeffrey Stier to the nominating committee and the nomination of Michael Goldberg to the position of Executive Vice President of the Board of Trustees.

We continue to encourage all congregants to join us for our meetings, held at TINR on the 3rd Wednesday of each month, at 7:30 PM. Our next meeting is February 21st.

### The TINR Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, February 21st for its regular monthly meeting. Highlights of the meeting included...

The board of trustees met for its regular monthly meeting which began with "Good and Welfare." Brian Heaps reported that the nominating committee has named Gary Frey to join the executive committee on an interim basis, filling the role of vice president, anticipating that he will fill the role of treasurer starting in July. The motion was made, seconded, and approved unanimously. In addition, the nominating committee named Mark Rosen and Lisa Keller Yakas to fill interim positions on the board. They will be formally proposed as new board members in June at the annual congregational meeting. The board participated in a brief re-introduction and an ice-breaker, in which we shared our "death row" last meal. Plenty of cheese and beef were represented.

Val Etra informed us that the father of our frequent piano accompanist, Miho, recently died. Temple Israel Cares is aware and will follow up appropriately.

Michael Goldberg then reported that the land use committee will meet for the first time this coming Monday. He encouraged honorary and active trustees to share his thoughts with him ahead of this meeting.

Cantor Glassman shared a brief teaching regarding this week's Torah portion. She called our attention specifically to the discussion of the light that burns eternally over the ark. The Cantor pointed out that this light is one of the few traditions that has persisted for millenia in our community with little change. We, members of this community, are keepers of the ner tamid, both metaphorically and literally. The torah further teaches us that is we, the congregants, who need the mishkan as a place to gather, to pray, to build community, and that God

dwells among us in our gathering.

Treasurer's Report: Lloyd reviewed the information included in the board packet. Total income and expenditures remain on budget.

Executive Director's Report: The ED report was included in the board packet. Anita highlighted that membership numbers and revenue are stable. In recent years, Kehillah School has been increasingly successful in leading to new family memberships. Anita and Cantor Rita highlighted the robust attendance at Family Shabbat and Community Shabbat.

Margie updated the board on the status of the elevator repair. The board unanimously voted in favor of approving funds for modernization of the elevator. This vote represents the required second vote to approve use of the funds. Work is unlikely to begin before May.

Lastly, Margie suggested that we move the standard start time for meetings to 7:00 pm. The board expressed consensus approval for the change. As such, we invite any congregants to join us on the third Wednesday of each month for BOT meetings at 7:00 pm at the temple.

### Cantor's Corner

### Tell, and Retell Our Stories



When I was already pretty grown up, I had a meeting with a man my father saved during the Holocaust. Yitzchak was thirteen at the time when my father saved him, along with his father who had a leather shop right next to my father's building supplies store in Vilna before the war.

In 1945, Yitzchak began a new life for himself, settling in Borough Park, Brooklyn, where he became a much beloved Rosh Yeshiva (head principal

of a Jewish learning academy). From this one man and his wife Judith (they were very prolific), today there are some 300+ living souls including great, great-grandchildren. They are all learned, religious Jews who continue to preserve the Jewish faith and love of Torah. Yitzchak, z'l, passed away at the ripe old age of 93 just a few years ago. This kind, learned, and gentle man told me how my father actually rescued nearly two hundred Jews over a two-night period in 1943 from Shlupishkes Prison (which still stands today in Vilna) during the Holocaust.

My father used his association with his father-in-law who was a member of the Judenrat (the Jewish Council put in charge of Jewish life in the Vilna Ghetto by the Nazis) to rescue Jews from that prison, falsely stating that he needed workers in the clothing factory run by his father-in-law who was a much sought after clothing designer before the war. As there was no real clothing factory in operation as the war progressed, and a quick phonecall to such factory would have proved this, Yitzchak said it was very risky for my father to attempt all this. My father basically bluffed the Nazi officer who was in charge of the prisoners. Since, as Yitzchak described it, my father showed no sign of fear and did not flinch even one bit when he made his request, the officer, though suspicious, went ahead and released all these Jews.

To Yitzchak, my father seemed to be on a mission to save as many Jews as he could during the Shoah, and the fact that he was successful at all was because God was protecting him. Yitzchak shared that the first people my father pointed to for work in the nonexistent factory were the learned Rabbis, teachers, and scholars he recognized from his native city. Clearly, my dad was intent on saving Jewish religious life as best he could, seeing the steady deterioration and destruction of Eastern Europe's Jews taking place all around him.

This year the holidays of Purim and Passover are exactly one month apart. While the main characters in the backstory of these two holidays are different, the emphasis is, thematically, pretty much the same. There are those who wish to oppress, destroy, and enslave the Jewish people-Haman in Persia, Pharoah in Egypt, and then there are the brave heroes/Jewish leaders like Moses, Mordechai, and Esther, who risk their lives by standing up to power and injustice. Each year in the spring, we tell the tale of our having overcome near annihilation in Persia, and then the freeing of our enslaved ancestors in Egypt. We recount with pride and joy how we emerged out of it all-one people, Torah-led, unfettered and free.

Purim and Passover each come with their own retelling of the stories of old. On Purim, we read from a Megillah scroll about a cast of interesting characters, a failed plot by an evil, vindictive man, while making lots of noise with groggers whenever this man's name is mentioned and eating jam filled Hamentaschen cookies (turning what was bitter into something sweet). On Passover, we read from a Haggadah, eat matzah, drink four cups of wine, and remember the historical moment of the Exodus as though we ourselves were the ones crossing the Red Sea to the shores of freedom, with timbrels in our hands and a song of victory on our lips.

So what do we learn from all this? That it is essential that we tell and retell our stories of oppression and liberation, and that we also listen to the stories of others who have experienced the same. May we recognize that we are all precious and beloved by God, that oppression of any kind is wrong, that freedom is everyone's God given right. May we as Jews be able to defend and protect our right to, not only exist, but to safely go to sleep each night and awaken each morning peacefully to life renewed. Finally, may we give thanks for those in our communal and personal histories who stood up for what was right, who risked their own lives with courage and determination so that the Jewish people, culture, and religion could endure.

So please join us on Saturday evening, March 23rd at 7 pm, when we will tell what happened in Shushan long ago, turn the Purim story on its head and show what occurs when anyone tries to mess with the likes of Queen Esther and Mordechai. Spoiler alert- you never know who will show up at our zany, rip roaring, *verklempt* Purim Spiel, but you can be assured the music will be "**taylored**" especially for you, very current, and possibly recognizable. All "SWIFTIES" strongly encouraged to attend! Til then...

Early childhood teachers practice this art by slowing down and creating respectful intelligent care partnerships throughout the day. In daily rituals such as hand washing, serving meals, diapering babies, and zipping coats, we transform mundane tasks into educational practices.

Respectful caring is the key to growing trusting relationships and inventive

learning. Hence, the art of caring for our children reflects both how we care for their hearts and minds.

We value our educational practices as a way to create trusting connections and peaceful pathways for educational growth and development.

To build these relationships it's vital that the Kehillah Faculty build their knowledge of developmentally appropriate practices and child development. As an Early Learning Childhood Center licensed by OCFS - The Office of Children and Family Services, our educators complete 30 hours of training every two years- so important as part of a pedagogy of care.

How is the Kehillah Faculty building their knowledge base of care?

"We sometimes speak as if caring did not require knowledge, as if caring for someone, for example, were simply a matter of good intentions or warm regard. But in order to care I must understand the other's needs and I must be able to respond properly to them, and clearly good intentions do not guarantee this. To care for someone, I must know many things."—Milton Mayeroff, author of <u>On</u> <u>Caring</u>

Knowing many things - caring for many ages and stages, is part of the art of care at Kehillah.

At Kehillah, we have built a partnership with the Childcare Council of Westchester. Our teachers attend in-house workshops with their trainers on topics such as "Teaching Infants and Toddlers," the "NAEYC Code of Ethical Conduct," and "TeamBuilding in Early Childhood." The council's training team spends time in our classrooms every month, guiding and supporting our teachers.

The Educators from "Teaching Beyond the Square" visit Kehillah every Fall with the Materials trailer. They bring lessons for our teachers and children in how to appreciate and care for "Loose Parts" as part of learning experiences. Our Judaic Education Director, Rebecca Elkus-Ferst, brings to light the principles of our Judiac faith through workshops for the teachers, Havdalah and Shabbat celebrations, and classroom visits with the children.

As part of on-line training, our educators attend "ChildCare Education Institute" courses, The Early Childhood Education and Training Program sponsored by the New York State Office of Children and Family Services, funded by the federal Administration for Children and Families (ACF) Office of Child Care and administered by the Professional Development Program, Rockefeller College, University at Albany, and Fairy Dust Teaching/Wunderled Trainings with Sally Haughey.

We value building knowledge on a continuing basis to support our "Pedagogy of Care:" - knowing we bring love and caring into our classrooms each day, knowing that we support all children's developmental ages and stages, and knowing that Temple Israel supports Kehillah's understating that care and education go hand in hand in our children's Early Childhood journey.

### **Hamentashen!**



There are lots of Jewish foods that we call delicious. Challah. Matzah ball soup. Kugel. Some you eat throughout the year and others are specific to a holiday, like Matzah. One of the best is my favorite to make with our youth and my children at home, Hamentashen. We've been taught that the triangle shape of Hamentashen are supposed to be like the hat Haman, the villain of our Purim story, wore. I've often wondered, why make something so delicious based on someone who was a bad guy, and wanted to annihilate the Jewish

community?

In Hebrew, the word, *tashen*, means "to weaken" and thereby eating hamen-TASHEN may celebrate the weakening of Haman and the hope that God will weaken all of the enemies of the Jewish community. This certainly hits very close to our hearts this year as we continue watching the events unfold in Israel and the hostage crisis. But just as pain and darkness exist in our world, we must also see, and find, the good and the things that make our world better. The hamantashen remind us of the sweetness that comes with confronting our fears and helping each other.

This year our youth in Kehillah and Chavaya will celebrate Purim through learning about the story and hearing Megillat Esther (the scroll of Esther), dressing up, making Hamentashen, giving Mishloach Manot (gifts of food and drink to family and friends), and providing Matanot L'evyonim (food to those who are food insecure). We are also very excited to be able to hold our first Purim Carnival on Tuesday, March 19th for our oldest Kehillah students and Chavaya students K-7th grade. We are looking for parent volunteers to help support the carnival so please reach out to me if you are interested and available.

And speaking of sweetness and helping those in need, we are also excited to bring back our Community Mitzvah Day on Sunday, April 7th. The day will begin with a light breakfast sponsored by Brotherhood. Projects will run from 10:00 am - 12:00 pm and the day will conclude with our gathering at Sharon Gardens Cemetery, where we will perform the mitzvah of burying Genizah. Ritual items like prayer books and Torah scrolls must be properly buried when they are deemed no longer usable and considered, Genizah. More information about Mitzvah Day will be communicated in the coming weeks.



### **CHOCOLATE HAMENTASCHEN!**

Yields 16 cookies

#### Ingredients

- 1 cup flour (plus 1 cup to use as needed when rolling out the dough)
  - 5 tablespoons powdered sugar
- 2 tablespoons cocoa powder
- 1 stick butter (cold, cut to cubes)
- 1 egg
- 1 cup white chocolate spread and/or 1 cup Nutella

#### Directions

- 1. Blend the flour, butter, cocoa powder, and powdered sugar until it becomes a crumbly mixture.
- 2. Add the egg and continue to blend until the dough starts to unify.
- **3.** Shape the dough into a disc-shape on baking paper and put it in the refrigerator for 30 minutes.
- 4. Take the dough out of the refrigerator and roll out on a floured surface.
- 5. Using a glass or a round cookie cutter, cut circles out of the dough.
- **6.** Fill each dough circle with 1 teaspoon of white chocolate spread or Nutella and close the dough into a triangular-shaped cookie.
- 7. Place the cookies on a baking tray covered with parchment paper.
- 8. Place the baking tray with the cookies in the freezer for 30 minutes.
- **9.** Heat the oven to 350°F.
- **10.** Bake the cookies for 14 minutes. Check them after about 10 minutes to see if they are ready, and if they are, take them out. Enjoy!
