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
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
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

Rabbi's **Note**

Keeping Our Eyes Open, Even When We Want to Look Away





Last November, as I toured Israel, time and time again, my heart broke for the loved ones whose lives were cut short by terrorists. Hearing the graphic details of the atrocities that Hamas and Islamic Jihad performed, was incredibly painful. Sitting in the bunkers where young people were murdered, being told about the terrorist throwing grenades into the shelter as the young men up front would throw them back was horrifying. Hearing the story

of American youth such as Hersh Goldberg-Polin and Edan Alexander who were brutalized and abducted, as well as physically going to the site of the Nova Music Festival, overwhelmed me with a sense of loss, hurt, and deep sadness. All I could think about was the pain that their parents must be feeling. Beautiful, wonderful young people whose lives were taken too soon, and their potential destroyed.

As I stood amongst the memorials and poppies of the field at Nova, I was overwhelmed by the thought that hate has brought so much destruction. As a parent, there is nothing worse than the loss of young innocent lives. While I stood there, my thoughts also turned to the children in Gaza. Every day, I hurt thinking about the death of all the children on both sides. I deeply wish that Hamas had never been successful in crossing the border and the resulting war never occurred. Even with this grief, I stand with Israel and its right to defend itself. I am still very aware, and my heart mourns for those who are most impacted, for all the people who have no freedom or choices, who are suffering.

I wish for the day when children across the globe can live in safety and Israel does not need to defend itself. But I am realistic enough to know that this is not likely. Even while I empathize with the plight of the Palestinians, my mind reminds me that those Israelis who were murdered were the people who volunteered and helped Gazans get medical help, were peace activists, and were deeply trying to improve the situation between Israelis and Palestinians. And they were targeted first.

But I also know that war is not a long-term solution. That no matter who the Israeli Defense Forces neutralize, that thousands more step forward to commit acts of terrorism and hate. That each war which Israel participates in, usually buffers some level of safety for only a few years. It pains me that there are no solutions, there is no fixing the dynamics making an option for long-term peace. For the most part, Palestinian society does not want to recognize Israel as a Zionist state with the legitimate rights to the land. And Israeli society has abandoned the hope of a two-state

solution, where Palestinians would live as their neighbors with the same full rights and freedoms that Israelis experience.

Courage is the willingness to sit in this pain, to refrain from giving advice, not succumbing to anger and desire for revenge. Courage is the willingness to sit with those in mourning, hear about their loss, the stories of their loved ones, and give witness to their pain. I will continue to mourn for all the innocent lives, especially those of the children. Empathizing and grieving does not condone or legitimize acts of terror. And I pray that the truce continues to hold, so that all children can play in the streets, study in their schools, make friendships, and hopefully find a better path forward for our world.

Cantor's Corner

The New Year of the Trees! Tu Bishvat Coming in February!





May the New Year of the Trees begin a year of growth, a year of renewal for the trees and for us.

May our blessings give strength to the trees and may our eyes be opened to the wonders of creation and may we nurture the world that so generously nurtures us.

- A Blessing for Tu Bishvat

Tu Bishvat falls this year as it does every year on the 15th (TU is made up of the Hebrew letters Tet and Vav with

their numerical equivalents 9 + 6) of the Hebrew month of Sh'vat which, on the secular calendar of 2025 is Wednesday, February 12th. The Kabbalists called it Rosh Hashanah La-i-la-not- the New Year of the Trees. Contemporary Jewish philosophers and those active in social justice issues say that Tu Bishvat is a time to consider the environment, to reflect on the relationship between humans (*Adam* in Hebrew) and the earth (*Adamah* in Hebrew) and take action on environmental protection. The thinking is that trees are vital to the health of the planet and can help mitigate climate change. In Israel, Tu Bishvat is celebrated as an ecological awareness day and many trees are planted.


I love the fact that going back all the way to Biblical times there was this deep reverence for trees and the natural world among the Jewish people. In fact, the Jewish mystics of the middle ages began a practice of having a Tu Bishvat Seder

modelled on the Passover Seder. The seder ritual includes the drinking of four cups of different colored wines to symbolize the changing seasons of the year, and the eating of 15 different kinds of tree fruits, plus what is known as the Seven Species (*Shivat Haminim*) that one finds in Israel-figs, dates, pomegranates, wheat, barley, grapes, and olives. These were the only fruit offerings accepted at the ancient Temple during the three pilgrimage festivals.

From ancient days, the Jewish people have been taught that we are not owners of the land and the trees, but stewards, and it is our job to protect and preserve our precious environment and all that it contains. Tu Bishvat is a time to remember that while there may be snow on the ground in February, the sap is already beginning to flow in the trees around us, daylight is slowly but steadily increasing and spring blossoms are not so far away.

This year, may this minor but very significant Jewish holiday inspire us to support the planting of trees in Israel or at home, join an organization that is working to protect and preserve the environment, take a moment to appreciate the beauty of this earth and the miraculous creation that trees are, especially ones that bear fruit, nuts, and flowers each year. May we commit ourselves to taking some action to assure that trees continue to live and thrive on our beloved planet, as they remind us of the cycles of life and renewal and how interconnected and interdependent we are with them and all of nature.




strength, and it's there for us not only to celebrate the highs but also to help ease the pressures of the season.

The TINR Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, November 20th for its regular monthly meeting.

The Board of Trustees met for its regular monthly meeting on November 20. The meeting began with an invocation from Rabbi Gallop. The Rabbi recently returned from a week-long trip to Israel. He reflected that his experience reminded him of what it means to live in a society that is actively under attack from terrorists. He shared with the board thoughts about the privilege of living in a society and a community in which our neighbors and our law enforcement agencies do welcome Jewish communities and work to protect them.

After the review and approval of recent minutes and membership updates, the board underwent CRASE (Civilian Response to Active Shooting Events) Training. Two members of the New Rochelle Police Department facilitated the training, which has previously been provided to Temple and Kehillah staff. The video shared with the board "Avoid, Deny, Defend," is available on the website: alerrt.org/course_types/CRASE.

In Good and Welfare, Val Etra welcomed the Rabbi home from Israel. She also shared that Cantor Glassman's original work at the community Jewish Music Celebration was beautiful, and so wonderfully received. Marilyn shared that Ilissa and Paul Warhit have a new healthy grandson.

The board concluded the meeting with the routine, required annual resolution for signing authority for Executive Director. The meeting adjourned at 9:15 pm.

The TINR Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, December 18th for its regular monthly meeting.


The Rabbi opened our meeting with an invocation and a reminder of the importance of courage in this season of light. He emphasized the value of rising above daily challenges, of being here together, in a place of safety and love! The board then approved the consent agenda, which included approval of the November minutes, the new members, and resignations, and the approval of reported parsonage declarations for the Rabbi and the Cantor.

The president's report, executive director's report, and the treasurer's report were included in the board packet and are available for review upon request. The board was delighted to learn that the Cantor and the compensation committee have reached an agreement for her to continue at TINR for another

two years.

The board then undertook a long conversation about the state of our heating and air conditioning system, much of which is original to the building, and well past its anticipated life-span. A replacement of our system will require a massive and expensive endeavor, given the sixty-plus-year-old state of our systems. Details are available from Anita upon request.

Good and Welfare: Margie Ostrove offered condolences to David Soberman on the loss of his father. Rabbi Jesse thanked the group for the constructive work of the board. Margie noted that a number of spam emails have been circulating from false email addresses. Please know that **no** emails requesting financial assistance from TINR leadership or TINR staff to our members are legitimate. This is what is called phishing. Of note, numerous congregants have reached out to Margie offering to help.



Respectful caring is key to growing trusting relationships and inventive learning. Hence, the art of caring for our children reflects both how we care for their hearts and minds.

We value our educational practices to create trusting connections and peaceful pathways for educational growth and development.

At **Kehillah**, we continue to build a partnership with the Childcare Council of Westchester. Our teachers will attend an in-house workshop in January 2025 on the NAEYC: National Association for the Education of Young Children Position Statement Advancing Equity in Early Childhood Education. The understanding of this position statement supports Kehillah's beliefs in respecting diversity and communicating with kindness.

The Educators from Teaching Beyond the Square visited Kehillah this Fall with a program "The Materialized Classroom" and will return in April 2025 with the Materials trailer. The TBS Educators bring lessons for our teachers and children in how to appreciate and care for "Loose Parts" as part of learning experiences. We support the TBS mantra:







It's Chanukah – Eight Happy Nights!

Candles are lit, the dreidel spins, Chocolate gelt means everyone wins. Gifts are swapped, and treats abound, Latkes sizzle, joy all around. The spirit of giving makes hearts glow, A holiday dance in the firelight's show.

Darkness falls, but have no fear, Chanukah's light is shining near. One small flame, a miracle bright, Chasing away the cold of night. We feast, we laugh, we play, we sing, Eight happy nights of our favorite things!



Chanukah Gelt Cookies

Ingredients

- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 3/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons milk (whichever kind you enjoy or can tolerate)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3/4 cup white sugar (1/2 cup and 1/4 cup divided)
- 1/3 cup dark brown sugar (packed)
- 1/2 cup unsalted butter at room temperature
- 3/4 cup creamy peanut butter, other nut butter, or tahini (spreadable, not gritty)

Instructions

- 1. Whisk the flour, baking soda, baking powder, and salt together in a small bowl and set aside.
- 2. Mix the egg, milk, and vanilla together in another small bowl and set aside.
- 3. Combine the 1/2 cup of white sugar, brown sugar, butter, and peanut butter in a bowl and beat with a hand or stand mixer until the mixture is light and fluffy (approximately 3-5 minutes). Start on a low setting and move up to medium-high.
- 4. Add the egg, milk, and vanilla mixture.
- 5. Add the dry ingredients in 3-4 batches, mixing on low each time, just until combined.
- 6. Form the dough into one-inch balls and roll them in the reserved 1/4 cup sugar. If the dough is too soft, refrigerate it for 20-40 minutes. Place the dough balls on a plate and chill them in the refrigerator for at least 30 minutes, longer if necessary until they are well chilled and easily taken off the plate without losing their shape.
- 7. Pre-heat oven to 375 degrees F. and unwrap the Chanukah gelt. If the coins are more than one inch in circumference, cut them in half.
- 8. Place the cookie balls on two parchment or silicone mat-lined cookie sheets. Bake the cookies for 8-10 minutes, rotating the pans halfway through.
- 9. Once the cookies are done, let them cool for one minute then gently insert the coins, one or one-half into each cookie. Cool completely before enjoying!
