Rabbi's Note

Lifting Our Spirits – Amen!



I have now heard the [cries] of the Israelites because the Egyptians are holding them in bondage, and I have remembered My covenant.

-Exodus 6:5

On Rosh Hashanah, I spoke about the importance of belonging and having a community where we share life together with others outside our families and work. Humans have a need to feel cared about, socially connected, and invested in a common

mission, like the Cheers theme song says: "Sometimes you want to go where everyone knows your name and they're always glad you came." I hope Temple Israel is your home away from home and our synagogue is a place that you look forward to going to and shutting out the craziness of the world.

While our mission seems straightforward – to be a welcoming house of worship focused on kindness and positive impact – building genuine connections is more complex. Finding people with whom you truly connect, where you feel comfortable sharing your life, takes time and effort. We offer enriching experiences like Community and Family Shabbat, adult programming, and impactful committees such as Temple Israel Cares and Social Action. Our goal is to make Temple Israel a place where spiritual growth and a strong sense of belonging flourish.

Our world is plagued by more than just isolation; it's rife with anger, hostility, and aggression. All too often, political and societal tensions infiltrate our synagogue community. The aftermath of the October 7th terrorist attack on Israel, and the divisions within American politics, have made this painfully clear. Modern tribalism fractures our culture, making meaningful dialogue across differing viewpoints increasingly difficult. We retreat into echo chambers, silencing perspectives we disagree with. How many of us have severed social media connections over a single political post? This is precisely why it is paramount that our Kehillah Kedosha, our sacred community, actively cultivates space for the diverse range of views within our congregation.

Judaism provides our foundation for worship, celebration, and action. The Torah reminds us that God remembered our ancestors in their most vulnerable state, as slaves. This profound act of care is central to our tradition. Our prophets championed the rights of the widow, the orphan, and the poor, lessons that continue to inspire us. Our covenant is inherently communal: God's concern for how we treat one another directly shapes our relationship with the Eternal..

Cantor's Corner

Lag B'Omer



Although it was quite a long time ago, I can still very happily recall the excitement, joy and celebration surrounding the holiday of Lag B'Omer at the Westchester Day School where I attended elementary school. Lag B'Omer was a day all of us WDS students looked forward to each year. We spent the entire day of the holiday outdoors on the beautiful 24 acre property on the Long Island Sound, having a picnic lunch under the trees, part of a great big Barbecue. I still remember the flavored ice cream

popsicles (I think my favorite was the orange flavor!), the singing, the dance session with our Israeli folk dance teacher. There was a whole array of games and activities (again all outdoors) and prizes were given after competitive races-I won the co-ed Broad Jump one year! I loved Lag B'Omer. It was a day full of joy, fun and camaraderie with my peers. It was the best!

So where does this holiday come from and what started it all in the first place. The word Lag is made up of two Hebrew letters-LAMED and GIMEL. The number associated with LAMED is 30 and the numerical equivalent of GIMEL is 3. So the holiday falls each year on the 33rd day of the counting of the Omer (the Barley harvest) which is somewhere in the middle between Passover (commemorating the exodus from slavery) and Shavuot (celebrating the receiving of the Torah on Mt. Sinai).

A very beloved and renowned Rabbi who lived in the Second Century of the Common Era, a student of the great sage Rabbi Akiva, was, like his teacher before him, threatened with his life by the Romans for studying Torah. Rabbi Shimon Bar Yochai, along with his son Rabbi Eleazar, went into hiding in a cave. Lo and behold because of a miraculous carob tree and a flowing stream, as the legend goes, Rabbi Shimon and his son were able to live in that cave for thirteen years. They continued to study Torah. Rabbi Shimon is one of the writers of the ZOHAR, the Book of Illuminations which is the foundational book of the *Kabbalah* (the Jewish mystical tradition).

Some years after emerging from the cave, Rabbi Shimon knew that his end was near. It was important to him that the day of his passing would not be a sad day. He determined that instead, the day of his exiting this earth would be a day of celebration and joy. That day happened to fall on Lag B'Omer, the 33rd day of the Omer. It is also important to note that in the time Rabbi Shimon Bar Yochai lived, there was a terrible plague during which thousands of Rabbi Akiva's students died. They say that on the 33rd day of the Omer, the plague stopped-another reason why we celebrate on this day.

In very orthodox Jewish communities, there is the ritual of UPSHEERIN-when three-year-old boys first have their hair cut. We didn't see any of that at the Westchester Day School, but I am so very grateful to have been able to celebrate with my fellow students and still have such fond, happy memories of a day in our school year when we got to be outdoors in nature celebrating Jewish life and honoring the brave, scholarly souls who are part of our rich history and heritage.

I hope you will join us on Friday evening, May 16th at 6:30pm, for a pre-neg BBQ in celebration and in honor of Lag B'Omer.

Honestly, on the most pressing issues of our time, particularly regarding Israel, I rarely feel my perspective is definitively 'correct.' Instead, I aim to inspire our community to engage deeply with these challenges, to come together as neighbors and friends, supporting what we believe is right while creating space for diverse viewpoints. Therefore, I will continue to voice my love and support for Israel and pray for the return of hostages, while also expressing empathy for

Palestinians, especially those who have lost homes and loved ones. I will advocate for us to love our neighbor as ourselves, particularly for those who feel marginalized in our society—whether transgender individuals, undocumented residents, those struggling with addiction and mental health, or anyone feeling lost in our challenging world. To me, that is the essence of a synagogue: not bound by politics, but a true home.




Margie Ostrove's father, Mitchell Ostrove, at his 1st Bar Mitzvah.

The TINR Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, March 19th for its regular monthly meeting.

Rabbi Jesse began the meeting talking about the challenges in Israel right now with changes in the Knesset and protests throughout Jerusalem. It is important to keep aware and pray for Israel's safety during this volatile time. Rabbi Jesse also encouraged board members to vote REFORM for the World Zionist Congress, which will help to promote a more inclusive Israel that recognizes Reform values. You can register to vote online; there is a \$5 administrative fee.

Camp Pinebrook Presentation by Allie Horn: In Allie's 3rd summer at Pinebrook, the camp continues to grow this summer, with enrollment currently at 370 campers across 8 weeks; they had a 62% retention rate, and a 63% early bird registration rate.

Unfortunately, we won't have the necessary permits from the City in time to install the 3rd pool this summer but it will be ready by summer 2026.

Executive Director's Report: Anita Aronoff referred to her written report.

Elevator demo: The elevator demo starts next week and the entire project should take a month to complete.

HVAC: Anita shared that in addition to the bid from Johnson Controls, the HVAC committed received a bid from another vendor on 3/17/25 which will need to be reviewed. They are still awaiting one more bid.

President's Report: Margie Ostrove referred to her written report.

All are encouraged to participate in the Israel Day Parade. TINR will be walking with WJC and it will be an opportunity to connect with a larger community in celebration.

Margie gave a special thanks to Rebecca Elkus-Ferst for putting together an awesome Purim carnival; there was a great turnout of families and parent volunteers, and the kids had a blast. Margie also acknowledged Cantor Rita and the Spiel participants as well as Cantor Rita's beautiful reading of the Megillah. The Brotherhood and Sisterhood contributed to a successful Purim as well with their homemade Hamantaschen.

Meeting adjourned.

The TINR Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, April 23rd for its regular monthly meeting.

Cantor Glassman opened our meeting with the poem "Lightening," by the writer Bon Scher, using the themes in the poem to draw our attention to the importance of using Jewish values and ideals to help us make strong, ethical choices during these turbulent times.

Education, Youth and Families Update: Rebecca Elkus-Ferst, director of the TINR religious school and director of youth and family engagement updated the board about changes in the religious school and youth and family engagement.

The board then discussed on-going building maintenance, repair, and improvements:

- Elevator: The elevator renovation process encountered a complication of water leaking into the shaft when the old piston was removed. Anita anticipates that sealing of the leak will begin in the next week, at which point, installation of the new elevator can begin.
- HVAC: Planning for the optimal approach to the HVAC system is still underway, with active conversations with several possible vendors.
- Camp Pool: The New Rochelle Planning Board approved the installation of the third pool, and the permitting process can now begin. We await approval from the Westchester Department of Health. We anticipate that we will be prepared to put the project out for bids in June or July.
- Roof: The roof replacement process continues: Bids have been received for repair of the roof above Forbes. Several additional sections of roof are still original; bids for the complete repair are included along with the existing bids.
- Security: The two sets of front doors will be replaced with a higher security system, funded by a security grant that we have obtained.

Meeting adjourned.

Food for Thought - Kavanah (intention)

"A mitzvah without kavanah is like a body without a soul." – Jewish teaching

In Hebrew, *kavanah* means "intention" or "focus." Rather than moving through life on autopilot, *kavanah* invites us to bring our full attention and heart to what we're doing. Even small acts, done with *kavanah*, can create deeper connection in all areas of our lives.

How can we bring kavanah into our daily routines?

- Start with a breath: Pause and take a deep breath before beginning your day or a new task.
- Set an intention: Say a short personal intention before meals, prayers, or transitions.
- Remove distractions: Be fully present in conversations by putting away devices and giving someone your undivided attention.
- Reflect regularly: Ask yourself:
 - o Am I fully present in this moment?
 - o What intention do I want to bring to this task or interaction?
 - o How can I align my actions today with what truly matters to me?

Spring Hummus Platter

Prep Time 15 minutes

Ingredients Extra Creamy Hummus

- 1 15 oz can chickpeas*, drained but liquid from can preserved
- 1 15 oz can white bean drained
- 1/2 cup tahini
- 1/4 cup + 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1/4 cup + 1 tablespoon liquid from chickpeas
- Juice of one lemon about 3-4 tablespoons
- 3-4 garlic cloves peeled
- 3/4-1 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon cumin
- Extra olive oil and lemon juice for topping
- 1 teaspoon Zataar for topping
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley for topping

Spring Veggie Platter

- 1 piece of naan toasted torn into pieces*
- 3 rainbow carrots cut into sticks
- 1 cup sugar snap peas
- 4-5 radishes sliced

Instructions

- 1. In a food processor, add the chickpeas, white beans, tahini, 1/4 cup olive oil and 1/4 cup aquafaba, lemon juice, garlic cloves, 3/4 teaspoon salt, and cumin and blend until smooth and creamy.
- 2. If hummus is too thick, add extra tablespoon of olive oil and liquid from chickpeas to thin out slightly.
- 3. Taste and adjust seasoning if necessary (may need to add the extra 1/4 teaspoon salt).
- 4. Transfer the hummus to a bowl and top with olive oil, lemon juice, and parsley. The batch makes enough for 2 serving bowls so can save the second half for later if desired.
- 5. Place bowl on platter. Serve with naan and vegetables.
- 6. Enjoy!



Recipe Notes

*If you have the patience, removing the skins from the chickpeas will make your hummus more smooth and creamy. For the naan, drizze with olive oil and garlic salt, and toast in a 350 degree over for 4-5 minutes so it's still pillowy.



Kehillah:Collaboration & Creativity



Kehillah continues a journey with Teaching Beyond the Square that nurtures both our children and teachers in the art of collaboration and creativity.

This school year Preschool & K-Prep participated in the Materialized Classroom experience in November and just recently with a visit from the Materials Trailer in April.

We see teachers not as mere providers of knowledge but as fellow researchers.

Teachers create their curriculum by collecting observations and posing questions to the children. By respecting the voice of each child and elevating the role of the teacher, a class can achieve a real sense of purpose and accomplishment through collaboration.

The Materials Trailer for Preschool & K-Prep

This is a program for Preschool & K-Prep consists of a Materials Trailer visiting Kehillah. Small groups of children shop at a time and each child selects five items to be permanently added to the classroom collection. Once all groups of children from a classroom have shopped, the Materials Educators will join teachers and children back in the classroom where the collected items from the Trailer will be spread out onto a fabric circle that we provide. The children will gather around to discover, experiment, collaborate and play with their new materials. Generally, these materials do not go home with the children; they are used repeatedly in the classroom, giving the materials a good, long life.

The children had an amazing experience shopping for materials on the trailer, joining the educators in a collaborative circle of conversation & guidance, and ultimately working with the materials and their imaginations.

Teaching Beyond the Square (TBS) is a nonprofit based in NYC which aims to improve the quality of early childhood education. Through collaborative partnerships with school communities, TBS works with students, educators, and parents to advance developmentally appropriate best practices which are more playful, effective, engaging, and equitable. Teaching Beyond the Square is unlocking the educational mindset, engaging families through the opportunity of play, and helping children... think outside the box.

What we know & what we honor:

Children Are Capable

Children are innately curious. They bring their experiences, ideas, and questions the moment they walk through the door. They naturally explore their surroundings to learn about their world and when given the chance - they are deeply motivated and self-directed.

Learning is an active process that should foster problem solving and creative thought. The use of open-ended materials should incite imagination not just instruction. Through the constant exchanging of ideas and the documentation of that process, children learn to look at projects and problems from different perspectives. It is then through reflection that children can fully appreciate and solidify their understanding.

Classrooms - and the materials that inhabit them - are an invitation. Whether they feel loud and didactic or warm and reflective of the child's perspective, they set the tone for a classroom community. It is through a sense of clarity and beauty that humans feel the ease to take risks and express themselves as they dare to learn and try things they have never done before.

It's with this knowledge we move forward with the continued elevation in Preschool & K-Prep through Kehillah's Reggio Inspired Curriculum and the growing partnership between Kehillah & TBS Teaching Beyond the Square which inspired the curating of the Materials Center.


