Hanukkah Blessings

Candles are added to the *hanukkiyah* (menorah) from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first. On the Shabbat of Hanukkah, kindle the Hanukkah lights first and then the Shabbat candles.

Light the shamash (the helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Hanukkah lights. As you do, say or sing:

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָּ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶדְּ הָעוֹלֶם, אֲשֶׁר קַדְּשֵׁנוּ בִּמִצְוֹתִיוּ, וצֵנוּ לִהַדְלִיק נֵר שֵׁל חַנְכָּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik ner

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the Hanukkah lights.

בָּרוּדְ אַתָּה יְיָ אֱלֹהֶינוּ מֱלֶדְ הָעוֹלָם, שֶׁעֲשָׂה נְסִים לַאֲבוֹתַינוּ וָאִמוֹתֵינוּ בַּיָּמִים הָהָם בַּוְּמֵן הַזָּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, she-asah nisim laavoteinu v'imoteinu bayamim hahaeim baz'man hazeh.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wonderous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

For first night only

We kindle these lights because of the wondrous deliverance You performed for our ancestors. During these eight days of Hanukkah, these lights are sacred; we are not to use them but only to behold them, so that their glow may rouse us to give thanks for Your wondrous acts of deliverance.

Rabbi's Note

Sharing With Others!



Late autumn is a special time of year.

After a busy couple of months of High Holy Days, back to school, and just the regular hustle and bustle of life, November sets the stage for the American "Holiday Season." A time for family to be together, grateful for all that we have, and share a spirit of joy. As the air is cool and crisp, we can take a moment to breathe it in and look around. Celebration is core to Jewish life; it reminds us of all that is good

and gives us a psychological and emotional uplift.

At Temple Israel, we use this time of year to give thanks by sharing our joys with others. One major way we do this is through the "Giving Tree," where we sponsor children in our local community who come from economically disadvantaged homes to make sure that they have a good Christmas or Chanukah. I invite you to "adopt" a child, making sure one or more youth gets a holiday. Too many in our local community (southern Westchester and the Bronx) are not able to provide life's extras for their children. By sponsoring a child, we ensure that a child knows that they matter. This is especially true for teenagers because they are often overlooked. High school students are still children, and they need support. This is not about getting extravagant presents, rather we are helping young people remember that their community cares about them.

I would ask parents to work with their kids together on this project. Many children do not fully understand charity because it is something that their parents or family does without them. Most children do not understand that life is based on limited resources. So, they learn by doing charity that one gives something of theirs that they would have otherwise had for themselves. One tradition that we had in my family when my kids were little, was that one night of Chanukah was focused on giving to others. So instead of receiving a gift that night, we donated to charity. I encourage you to try this with your family this year.

Chanukah is a holiday of miracles, about having light in dark times. By giving charity, we can inspire ourselves to remember that we have so much for which to be grateful. It is a holiday that thanks God that we have survived as a people, with the freedom to observe our faith. While Chanukah is a minor holiday, it should be one that brings us lots of joy. And what better way to appreciate life, then by sharing with others.

I hope you have a meaningful, blessed, and joyful Chanukah,

From the President

Memories of Chanukah



Chanukah - the Festival of Lights - is coming up next month so I wanted to share my personal reflections. Chanukah, which means 'rededication', is sometimes viewed as a relatively minor holiday. But it has always had major significance for me.

I grew up in an area of Queens with very few Jews. Celebrating or even talking about Jewish holidays struck my classmates and neighbors as somewhat

strange. But my parents embraced the Jewish holidays. My sister and I took turns lighting the Menorah each night, although my Father didn't want to put the Menorah in the window. He would retell the story each year of the Maccabees and how 2000 years ago they triumphed over the Syrian-Greeks and rededicated the Temple in Jerusalem. Their faith and unity allowed them to defeat a foe with far greater forces. The jar of oil, which was supposed to last for 1 day, lasted for 8 days as a symbol of the miracle of Chanukah. For me, the message of Chanukah is the sovereignty of the Jewish people.

When I got married, I wanted my children to have a different experience. I looked for a Jewish neighborhood and found one on the north end of New Rochelle. We carried on the family tradition of our children alternating Menorah candle lighting. And, of course, there was the annual dispute of who should light the *shamash*. Like my Father, we kept our Menorah on our fireplace mantle.

One of the warmest Chanukah memories that I have is getting off the 63 bus each night and walking home on Top-of-The Ridge and Donnybrook Roads. Almost every house along the way had a Menorah glowing in the window. What a difference from my experience growing up. Now, my children celebrate Chanukah with their children. *L'Dor v Dor.* As Rabbi Wohl told me many years ago, this is the promise of eternal life. As a grandfather, when I think of the Chanukah miracles, I also think of the many miracles that God has bestowed on me. And being part of a multi-cultural family, it was fun for me to watch my Chinese grand-nieces wrapping gifts in Chanukah gift wrapping. Chanukah is a great way of introducing young children to Judaism.

The Menorah should also alert us of the people in need. The lights should remind us to give *Tzedakah* and to wish a Chag Sameach to someone who needs to hear a kind word. Festive holidays are always a good time to think of our role in Tikun Olam. And being a tax accountant, my advice to you is to give Tzedakah before December 31st in order to claim your tax deduction in 2025.

Temple Israel celebrates Chanukah in a few ways. Of course, our Temple menorah will be lit. The Brotherhood serves latkes that they make at the *Latkes & Vodka* event. You can enjoy the latkes at the Community Shabbat and dinner on December 12th and participate in the *Latkes & Vodka* event on December 11th. Both events are scheduled for 6 pm.

My warmest wishes for you and your family for a Happy Chanukah. May the light of our Menorahs signal an enlightened future and an end to the darkness, for our country and world.

The TINR Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, October 15th, for its regular monthly meeting.

Invocation – Cantor Rita remarked on the collective sigh of relief we are breathing as the remaining living hostages return home. May this also be an opportunity to promote peaceful coexistence in the region, where everyone can live their lives with dignity.

Michael Goldberg made a motion to approve the following committee chairs: Gary Frey for the Finance Committee, Gary Frey for the Investment Endowment Subcommittee, Margie Ostrove for the Nominating Committee, Michael Goldberg for the Compensation Committee, Dan Weiser for the Ritual Committee, Allen Fishbein and Sharon Gorman for Social Action Committee. The motion was approved unanimously.

Cantor's A Time for Miracles, Menorahs, and Music



Just when the days are shortest in the northern hemisphere, the skies turn a little darker and the temperatures go down, the bright and joyous holiday of Chanukah (The Festival of Lights) rolls in. It never fails to lift my spirit and remind me of the light that, while temporarily hidden, will soon emerge. Chanukah is a holiday that focuses on miracles from many centuries ago, in the days of the Maccabees, when this small band of brothers together with their father overtook the much larger Greco-Syrian army. They polished up

and rededicated the Temple in Jerusalem (the word Chanukah means "rededication") which had been desecrated, so we could continue as a Jewish people with our traditions and rituals intact. There is also the miracle of the small flask of oil, discovered on the return of the Maccabees to the Jerusalem Temple, which was lit and only supposed to last one day, but instead lasted for eight whole days. We celebrate this joyous winter holiday with our families and our Temple Israel community with the lighting of the menorah, with dreydl games, latkes, sufganiyot and plenty of song!

On the more silly musical side, I'm thinking of Tom Lehrer's wonderful "I'm Spending Chanukah in Santa Monica" and Adam Sandler's "The Chanukah Song" which has been written, rewritten and written again to much acclaim and laughter. There's a miracle right there-an offbeat Chanukah song which has caught many peoples' attention of different faiths, proving that celebrating Chanukah is just as "cool" as celebrating any other holiday in December. Then there are the more serious, soulful songs that deliver a profound message about the deeper meaning of the holiday. The songs of Chanukah convey the pride Jews take in our history, and the ways that, time and time again, we overcame the darkness that surrounded us, leaned into and lifted up the light.

So, with what I see as my Cantorial responsibility to "en'light'en" my congregants as far as the vast and diverse musical offerings of Chanukah, I include here four songs to add to your celebration. I hope they will bring a chuckle, moments of festival joy, and yes, a whole lot of light, hope and inspiration in these times.



Apple Cider-Glazed Salmon

Yields: 4 - 6 serving(s) Prep Time: 35 mins Total Time: 45 mins



Ingredients

- · Vegetable oil, for the baking dish
- 1 cup apple cider
- 2 tbsp. packed dark brown sugar
- 2 tsp. sov sauce
- 1 1/2 tsp. freshly grated ginger (from a 3/4-inch piece)
- 1/4 tsp. paprika
- 5 garlic cloves, grated
- 6 tbsp. salted butter
- Juice of 1 lemon
- 1 (2-pound) piece center-cut salmon, skin removed
- 2 tsp. kosher salt
- 3/4 tsp. black pepper
- 1 1/2 lb. small red-skinned potatoes, quartered
- 1 lb. green beans, trimmed

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400°F. Oil a 9-by-13-inch baking dish. For the glaze: Combine the apple cider, brown sugar, soy sauce, ginger, paprika, and 2 grated garlic cloves in a medium saucepan over medium-high heat. Bring to a boil, reduce to a simmer , and cook, stirring often, until syrupy, about 15 minutes. Whisk in 2 tablespoons butter and the juice of ½ lemon. Set aside half of the glaze in a small bowl for serving.
- 2. Pat the salmon dry with paper towels and place in the prepared baking dish. Season with ¾ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper, then brush with the remaining glaze in the saucepan. Roast until the salmon is opaque and flakes easily with a fork, 18 to 20 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, bring 1 inch of water to a simmer in a large pot fitted with a steamer basket. Add the potatoes, cover,



- and cook for 8 minutes. Add the green beans on top of the potatoes, cover, and cook until the beans are crisp-tender and the potatoes are easily pierced with a paring knife, about 5 minutes.
- 4. Carefully remove the steamer basket and vegetables from the pot. Wipe the pot clean, then add the remaining 4 tablespoons butter and melt over medium heat. Stir in the remaining 3 grated garlic cloves and cook until fragrant, about 30 seconds. Return the potatoes and green beans to the pot. Toss with the juice of the remaining ½ lemon, 1¼ teaspoons salt, and ½ teaspoon pepper.
- 5. Brush the salmon with the reserved glaze and serve with the vegetables.



Pickleball, named for the green color of the ball, is typically played on a smaller court than tennis, with a net that's lower to the ground. Players use paddles to hit a plastic ball with holes over the net, aiming to score points by landing the ball within the opposing team's court. What makes pickleball beginner-friendly is the slower pace compared to tennis, the smaller court size, and the emphasis on strategy rather than sheer athleticism. Whether you're looking to stay active, make new friends, or try something fun, pickleball offers an enjoyable introduction to racquet sports.


